Sermon followed by Service

February 4, 2024

Luke 23:26-34

A thousand more churches shut down than opened up. Not last year, not the COVID years before; but 2019, the year before COVID hit. Now, across America, fewer than two-thirds claim to be Christian, down from three-fourths just ten years ago. In another generation or so, people claiming to be Christian will be in the minority. For our children, that may already be true; for children across America, most of their peers don't know what it means to be Christian. Here in Lake County, the numbers don't seem so bad, but there are far more people who claim to be Christian than who actually believe or live as Christians. And those who aren't Christian, what do they think of us Christians? They're more likely to describe us as misogynistic, racist, and controlling than generous, friendly, and caring.

Those are just the stats. What about the stories? A middle schooler is shamed by his teacher in front of the class for saying he believes God created the world. A woman loses her job for refusing to go along with immoral or unethical behavior. I could go on, but you have your own stories, don't you? Funny looks, barbed comments, cold shoulders you get because you're Christian.

With all that going on around us, it can be so easy to think what? "We poor Christians." It can be so easy to think of ourselves as victims. And then what? We get wrapped up in our hurts and our frustrations and our disappointments; we get wrapped up in our fixes and our smarts and our power. In other words, we get wrapped up in our self.

Wrapped up in our self, it can be so easy to lose perspective. We are more free here to live and speak as Christians than billions of people around the world. Around the world, millions of Christians are in danger of being arrested, imprisoned, kidnaped, tortured, killed - why? for living and speaking as Christians. The freedom that we enjoy - to live and speak as Christians - even if it's less than what it used to be - is the exception in human history.

More importantly, when we get wrapped up in our self, thinking of ourselves as victims, we become defensive, attacking; offensive grumbling and complaining, judging. We fall into the trap of looking to politics and politicians, lawsuits and courts, thinking they will fix our world for the church. When we think of ourselves as victims, instead of living with the victory of Jesus Christ, we lose sight of what Jesus has for us - and we can't help but feel sorry for ourselves.

Should we? Should we feel sorry for ourselves? Should we be looking for pity? We won't get it from the world. Many people are glad to see Christianity's influence fading, glad to see us Christians put back in "our place," hoping to see us shut up and shut out. They're not thinking: "Poor Christians."

Poor Christians. Is that what Jesus would say?

Picture Jesus on the way to Golgotha, to the cross. His back shredded from the scourging. His face bruised purple from being beaten before the Jewish leaders, and Herod, and Pilate. Blood dripping from the thorns in his scalp. After a night without sleep, after a night of abuse, he's exhausted. His body crumples under the weight of the cross, so the soldiers draft someone from the crowd to carry it.

No wonder the women mourned and wailed! We don't know whether they were followers of Jesus or just followers of the action. Either way, we do know the sight of Jesus so brutally treated had them weeping and mourning.

But what does Jesus say? "Don't cry for me! Mourn for yourselves and for your children!" In fact, just five days earlier, Jesus had wept over the people of Jerusalem. Because they had rejected God's promised and delivered Messiah, they would experience God's judgment. The time was coming when mothers would rather be childless than have to watch their chidden suffer. People would beg to be crushed to death by a mountain rather than be starved, taken prisoner, tortured, and enslaved by their enemies. History tells us of those horrific things that happened just 40 years later when the Romans came to crush Jerusalem's revolt. Thinking ahead, Jesus didn't cheer that they would get what they had coming. No, before any of it happened, Jesus wept.

Jesus wept. Not for himself, but for his people coming under judgment. And not just for them, not just for his own people. Follow Jesus to the Place of the Skull; listen to Jesus as he's nailed to the cross. What are his first words? "Father, forgive them." Forgive whom? His disciples? The women weeping for him? No, forgive the soldiers driving the nails through his hands and feet!

What do we hear there? A heart focused on others instead of self. He's thinking about the families of Israel, the Israel that's rejecting him. He's thinking about the soldiers who had no idea they were crucifying the Son of God. He's thinking of you and me. If Jesus had pitied himself, he could have escaped. But he was pitying us wretched sinners who were facing an eternal judgment, an eternal

destruction far worse than anything the Romans could mete out. That's what we deserve, but Jesus had sympathy for us, for you.

Think about that. Jesus' heart went out for you. But he didn't just weep for you, he took God's punishment for you. He died for you. He shed his blood to cover you, to hide you from the judgment and destruction that is coming.

What kept Jesus going through all that, through all that was being done to him? Thinking of you. Thinking of what he was doing for you. Thinking of you with him in heaven.

And what keeps us going? Not self-pity. Self-pity for how hard it might be to be a Christian doesn't keep us going; self pity sinks us. So what keeps us going? Anger? Pride? Pride that we're sticking with Christ? Anger against those against Christ? Anger and pride don't keep us going with Christ. Anger and pride show a heart twisting away from Christ.

So what keeps us going? Looking past ourselves, past our pride, past our hurts. Looking past ourselves to Jesus. To Jesus and his cross, to Jesus and his Easter. As we look to Jesus, we find strength in his Word and sacraments - "I'm here for you; I've got you; I'll get you through this." And as we see Jesus, we find him helping us carry our crosses.

Not just to get through the day. Not just to get through the harassment. Not just to escape. Not just to win our way and get our say. But Jesus helps us carry our crosses so we can look past our self and to look with pity, with sympathy, with love on the people around us.

We have brothers and sisters in the faith who are struggling with pain and temptation. We have people in the pews with us who are feeling the attacks of our anti-Christian world, people with us who are feeling harassed and put down for trying to walk the walk, and talk the walk of Jesus. Walk with them, talk with them, pray for them and remind them of what Jesus has for them.

And not just for them. Remember whom Jesus wept over; remember whom Jesus prayed for: "Father, forgive them." People who were rejecting him, people who were nailing him to the cross. There is a destruction coming that this world cannot fathom, infinitely worse than the atrocities that took place in Jerusalem. Some might joke about it; some might deny it. But so many of those who put God on trial, so many of those who test you and judge you, are like the soldiers crucifying Jesus. They have no idea what they're doing. They might think they're fighting against outdated values or old-fashioned fairy tales; they might think they're fighting for freedom and love. But they don't realize they're fighting against the Son of God, and they have no idea how badly it will end for them.

What if we saw those people like Jesus saw them. Not as enemies or obstacles, but as sinners like us. What if we saw them as fellow sinners who have been so duped by Satan's lies that they're doing his bidding without really realizing it? What if we were to have pity on them, pray for them, warn them, tell them about God's forgiveness, just like Jesus did? Who knows how many might join us with Jesus!

So, in a world turning against Christ and his church, let's skip the self-pity - it won't do anybody any good. Instead of self-pity, show and share the pity, or better, the grace and mercy of Jesus. How? Not like a victim, but like a victor with the victory of Jesus.

"Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven!"

The God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast. To him be the power for ever and ever. Amen. (1 Peter 5:10-11)



Luke 19:41-44; 23:26-34

As he approached Jerusalem and saw the city, he wept over it and said, "If you, even you, had only known on this day what would bring you peace—but now it is hidden from your eyes. The days will come upon you when your enemies will build an embankment against you and encircle you and hem you in on every side. They will dash you to the ground, you and the children within your walls. They will not leave one stone on another, because you did not recognize the time of God's coming to you."

As the soldiers led him away, they seized Simon from Cyrene, who was on his way in from the country, and put the cross on him and made him carry it behind Jesus. A large number of people followed him, including women who mourned and wailed for him. Jesus turned and said to them, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me; weep for yourselves and for your children. For the time will come when you will say, 'Blessed are the childless women, the wombs that never bore and the breasts that never nursed!' Then

NICENE CREED

Gracious God, you govern and direct all things and you love all people. Hear our prayers, spoken and silent, and answer them in your wisdom and grace.



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Celebration in Uganda

Last summer, our synod declared fellowship with the Obadiah Lutheran Synod (OLS), a small confessional Lutheran church body in the African nation of Uganda. On Jan. 13, the OLS held a synodwide worship service celebrating its fellowship with WELS. Members of the OLS traveled from towns and villages through southeastern Uganda to attend—some for more than six hours. More than 800 people attended the special worship celebration. Missionary Howard Mohlke and I were blessed to attend as the representatives of WELS.

The morning began with heavy rains. Because the celebration was to be held outdoors and the dirt roads leading to the location were impassable, the service was delayed for several hours until the rain stopped. But the weather did not dampen the enthusiasm of those who came to worship. The service began with songs by the youth choir and with the robust singing of many hymns by the worshipers. The service also included the ordination of a new OLS pastor, an address by OLS President Makisimu Musa, and words of encouragement from many of the OLS pastors in attendance. The celebration also included words of greeting from the WELS representatives as well as encouraging words of congratulations by local and national Ugandan government officials.

Just as the delegates at our WELS convention last summer were overjoyed to establish fellowship with the OLS and thanked God for the blessing, so the people of the OLS shared in that joy and thanks.

The OLS is planting new congregations in towns and villages throughout Uganda, and it is being blessed with a growth in membership. Along with that growth comes challenges, especially when it comes to the need for all-wheel drive vehicles that can negotiate the bumpy and muddy roads to enable contact with remote congregations. And while the synod builds its own churches with locally made mud-fired brick, it is in need of funds to provide roofs for those buildings.

WELS members have been generous in their support for these projects, and the OLS is very grateful for what has been received. But additional funds are needed to complete the necessary projects.
