Sermon followed by Service

April 2, 2023 Philippians 2:1-11

"Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" Some cheered, Hosanna!" I imagine some snickered, sneered, and snorted: "Hosanna?! Is that the best they can do?" And I imagine that by the end of the week, some were sighing, "Hosanna? Was that the best he could do?"

Jesus is riding into Jerusalem, a crowd growing around him, shouting, cheering "Hosanna!", preparing the way for their King, waving palm branches, covering the road before Jesus with their shirts and jackets and palm branches, shouting, cheering: "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord." In the crowd of disciples, it was a glorious day for Jesus.

From along the way, from high up on the walls, a guy riding on a donkey with a rag-tag crowd waving branches, shouting this and that - it probably didn't look all that impressive. To the world, it deserved little more than a snicker and a snort - "Is that the best they can do?"

At the end of the week, with Jesus riding a cross instead of a donkey, with most all his disciples scattered and hiding, with the Good Friday crowds first shouting, "Crucify him," and then mocking him, "If you're the King of the Jews, save yourself," how many from the Palm Sunday crowd who had been cheering, "Hosanna!," were now sighing, "Is that the best he could do?"

Sometimes what Jesus does doesn't look all that impressive. Sometimes what his church does doesn't look all the impressive. Sometimes, with what the world sees of Christ and his church, it's no wonder the world snickers and snorts. Sometimes, with what we see of Christ and his church, it's no wonder we sigh.

Seeing Jesus riding a donkey instead of a war horse, a donkey instead of a royal steed, can help us keep perspective. Jesus didn't come to earth to ride high on a horse, to live a royal life of comfort and ease. What did Paul say? Jesus gave up the glory and comfort of his place in heaven; he set aside his power and rule; he came to live the life and die the death of a servant. Not just the life and death of any servant. Jesus came to live the life of God's servant. He lived to do what God had for him to do; he lived to serve God by serving God's world.

We hear it in Jesus' words and we see it in Jesus' actions. A month ago we heard Jesus tell his parable of the Good Samaritan - not only did Jesus tell the story, he lived the life - helping, healing, loving, caring. This next week we'll hear Jesus: "A new command I give you: love one another." Not only did Jesus command it with his words; this next week we'll see Jesus live it, first, by getting down on his hands and knees and washing his disciples feet, then by sacrificing his whole body on the cross. Over these past few weeks, we've heard Jesus say the words: "The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." This next week, we'll see Jesus live it.

He won't just dip his toes into it, or lend a hand. He will put his whole self - body and soul - into living as God's servant. And it will cost him his life; God will demand his death. Looking at Jesus in pain on the cross, the world will snicker and snort, "Is that the best he could do; ha!" And seeing Jesus nailed to the cross, his followers will sigh, "Is that the best he could do?" But what they didn't see was what God saw and sees even today. What God saw was Jesus stepping in for us: "Surely he took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows …. But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed."

For the ways we expect to be served instead of serving ... for the ways we sit on the sidelines and let others do what God has given us to do ... for the ways we lift a finger and imagine we are moving a mountain ... for the ways we give a dime and think we're giving a fortune ... for the ways we talk the talk, but don't walk the walk ... for all the reasons we give the world to snicker and snort at Christ and the church - "is that the best they can do!" ... for all the reasons we give each other to sigh -"is this the best we can do?" Jesus stepped in as God's servant and took our place. He took our place and died the death we deserve.

And so often, too often, we sigh - "is that the best he could do?" - while the world snickers and snorts. But we know what we do not see. God raised Jesus back to life. God raised up his servant to rule as King. The day is coming when the world's snickering and snorting will turn to weeping and gnashing of teeth. The day is coming when our sighing will turn to cheering.

So what do we do? We aren't just along for the ride, are we? We're not here just to cheer. What did Paul say? "If you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from his love, if any fellowship with the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, then make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and purpose. Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves. Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others. Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus."

If Jesus means anything to us, we're not just along for the ride; we aren't here just to cheer. We're here to raise up our voices and to give up our lives. We're here to celebrate Jesus, not from the sidelines but from the front-lines. We're here to be like Jesus. How? By setting our self aside to serve our God and serve his world. In other words, we're here to live the God-Lived Life, a life of serving others.

What does that look like? It looks like what so many of you are doing here and out in the world. Serving, helping, caring - not to get ahead for self, not to make the world a better place for the world, but serving, helping, caring because you are exercising God's heart inside you. I see it in so many of you, and God sees it way more than I do.

What does the God-Lived Life look like? It looks like what we could be doing here and out in the world - raising the bar, stretching our reach, serving like Mary and Martha, stepping in like the Good Samaritan. What does the God-Lived Life look like? It looks like Jesus. Serving like Jesus, caring like Jesus, giving like Jesus. It might not always look impressive or feel impressive. At times, it might leave the world snorting and snickering - "is that all?" At times, it might leave us sighing - "is this all?"

But that's not how God sees it. With Jesus covering you, with his Spirit alive inside you, as you give yourself to serve him, as you give yourself showing his love to the world, God sees you covered with Jesus; he sees you shining like Jesus. He sees you here and today hand-in-hand serving with Jesus here, and he sees you in heaven someday side-by-side with Jesus, ruling with Jesus forever.

And there will be no more snickering or snorting from the world - "Is that the best they can do?" No more sighing in the church - "Is this the best we can do?" Instead we will be cheering with the angels: "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna!" Amen.

Gospel 11

John 15:15–21;

As they approached Jerusalem and came to Bethphage on the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go to the village ahead of you, and at once you will find a donkey tied there, with her colt by her. Untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, say that the Lord needs them, and he will send them right away."

This took place to fulfill what was spoken through the prophet:

"Say to Daughter Zion, 'See, your king comes to you, gentle and riding on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey.' "

The disciples went and did as Jesus had instructed them. They brought the donkey and the colt and placed their cloaks on them for Jesus to sit on. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and those that followed shouted,

"Hosanna to the Son of David!"

"Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"

"Hosanna in the highest heaven!"


When Jesus entered Jerusalem, the whole city was stirred and asked, "Who is this?"

SERMON

NICENE CREED

Lift the eyes of the distressed to your love in Christ.


Hear us, Lord, as we pray in silence.

Gracious God, you govern and direct all things and you love all people. Hear our prayers, spoken and silent, and answer them in your wisdom and grace.



LORD'S PRAYER




WORDS OF INSTITUTION

Holy Thursday

Jesus, the Son of God himself, invites you to the Upper Room to show you "the full extent of his love." Join him at his table as he gives you his body and blood, "given and shed for you,

for the forgiveness of your sins." Witness the Rite of the Stripping of the Altar and strengthen your resolve to never abandon the Lord. (Plan to leave the service quietly, reflecting on the love of our Lord.)

Good Friday

Alone in the dark, forsaken by God, Jesus pays for your sin and the sin of the world. Join us for a Good Friday Tenebrae Service, a service of shadows and darkness, reminding us of the darkness of our sin and guilt, the darkness of the world's hate and anger against God, and, yes, the darkness of God's curse on our sin, all charged against Jesus.

In a Tenebrae service, candles are extinguished and lights are dimmed to impress on us the utter darkness and loneliness, the horrible curse that Jesus faced on the cross. As you hear of Jesus' burial and the service closes, expect to hear the *strepitus* and see a sign of hope. (Again, plan to leave the service quietly, reflecting on the love of our Lord.)

Easter Sunday

We can't wait for the sun to come up! We have a living Jesus to meet! Join us for Easter service at 9, food and fellowship at 10, and Service at 11. You don't have to be quiet leaving this service – rejoice and tell your world the best news of the year - Jesus lives!
