Sermon followed by Service

June 11, 2023

"It's just not possible! You expect the impossible! They expect the impossible! God expects the impossible! Life is just plain too impossible!" Ever feel that way? In our lesson today, we meet some people going through some just impossible times, and what do we see? Impossible Faith for Impossible Times.

It's about 870 years BC, before Christ is born. Life is getting impossible for God's people in Israel. Why? God is angry. King Ahab and his wicked wife Jezebel were leading the country into Baal worship; in fact, we're told: "Ahab did more to provoke the LORD to anger than did all the kings of Israel before him." Ahab had taught the people to worship Baal; now God is teaching Israel the consequences of rejecting him. God sent a famine on the land; for three years no rain, not even dew on the ground. The crops failed; the rivers and streams dried up. The people are running out of food. Even God's prophet Elijah didn't have anything to eat. And things were little better for the widow of Zarephath.

Imagine what she must be thinking. She has just a handful of flour and little oil – barely enough for one last meal for her and her son. She's picking up sticks for the fire to cook that one last meal. Her plan is simple – to cook and eat, then starve and die, while she watches her son starve and die. What an impossible spot to be in. And then this guy Elijah comes up - to her a stranger - Elijah comes up and asks her for her food. If you're that widow, what are you thinking? "You gotta be kidding! Impossible!!!" Right? Wrong!

The Lord had a plan and a promise to make the impossible possible. Elijah tells the widow - "Don't worry. This is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: 'the jar of flour will not be used up and the jug of oil will not run dry until the day the LORD gives rain on the land." And what happened? God kept his promise! "There was food every day. The jar of flour was not used up. The jug of oil did not run dry. Just as the LORD had said."

Notice what Elijah didn't say. He didn't say, "Don't worry; here's a wagon-load of flour. Don't worry; here's a barrel of oil." God didn't provide a

warehouse of food up front; no, he provided their daily bread, day by day. God didn't give the widow the chance to think, "I don't need to worry because I've got a pantry full of food." But God helped her believe: "I don't need to worry because the Lord will provide." What a lesson! "I don't know how; I can't see how; it doesn't make any sense to me how; but God will take care of me!"

What a great lesson for us! We may have our savings accounts, our retirement accounts, our insurance, our emergency funds. And they can be good. In Proverbs, God our Provider tells us it is a wise thing to save and be prepared. Or the way that we look after our savings accounts and retirement accounts, our insurance and emergency funds - if we put them first before God - they can be as evil as worshiping Baal and Asherah. It can be so easy to love the stuff of this world more than we love God; it can be so easy to think that the key to our well-being, the key to our contentment, the key to our comfort is in our planning and the size of our accounts, rather than in the plan and promise, the heart and power of the Lord. But all the savings accounts and emergency funds and insurance in the world can't take the place of "Don't worry, your Father's got you; don't worry, the Lord will provide."

The LORD provides. We see it in our lesson – the Lord provided the impossible. How? Did he work the miracle in the pantry? Did he work the miracle in the spoon? We don't know. We don't need to know how. We know what matters - the LORD provided. And he still provides today. Every day the sun shines on the earth. How? We could talk about hydrogen burning, but finally we have to say, "The Lord provides." Every year we have rain and snow. How? We could talk about temperature and humidity and condensation, but finally we have to say, "The Lord provides." Crops grow and people grow. How? We could talk about food and water, but again the final answer has to be, "The Lord provides." Whether it's the flour and oil in the widow's pantry or the crops in the fields, or the food in the grocer's freezers, "The Lord provides."

Not always everything I want. Not always as much as I want. Not always when I want. And so sometimes I worry; sometimes I grumble; sometimes I envy. Why? Because I have a two-year-old inside me who always wants more, who thinks I know better, who thinks I should have my way. Like two-year-olds, we can be really mixed up on wants and needs, what's good for us, who knows best. Like two-year-olds, we can show our smarts and our wants in some really

ugly, painful ways - "If you don't give me what I want, I want a different daddy." We might not say it, but how often don't we live it?

But we don't have to. We don't have to stay stuck on our wants and our smarts thinking that life is impossible if we don't get our way and get what we want. I think of the Apostle Paul, locked up in prison chains: "I have learned the secret of contentment." It's a secret that is learned best when we don't have everything we want, when we don't have everything we think we need. When we don't have all we want, when we don't have all we think we need, we find out what it means to have Jesus: "I am strong for all things through him who gives me strength. ... My God will meet all your needs according to his glorious riches in Christ Jesus."

Our Lord meets all our needs. At times and in ways impossible for us to understand. Like on the cross. We needed something more impossible than a never-empty pantry; we needed an always-perfect life. We needed something more impossible than buying all the food in the world; we needed our sin paid for. And there on the cross the Lord provided the impossible. There in obedience to his Father, Jesus gave his always-right life for you. There as payment for your sin, Jesus died for you. With Jesus, no matter what you have done - you are forgiven; your sin is gone! With Jesus, no matter how wrong things go for you, you are right with God. How can you know? Not because of your comfort level, but because God says so! Does that seem impossible? Look at Easter. You have a God who did and does the impossible! You have a God who will meet your every need.

Don't you love that promise? It goes with this promise: "Seek first the kingdom of God and all these other things, clothing and food and right down the list, all these other things will be given to you as well." "Seek first" That sounds like Elijah and God's promise to that mom in Zarephath - first take care of God's business, and God will take care of you - no matter how impossible it seems.

Sometimes with God's impossible promises, it might seem like a good idea to hedge our bets. Common sense might have told the widow to hold back, to see if God would come through on his promise and then offer Elijah that piece of bread. But God didn't give the widow a chance to settle into a half-hearted

faith. She lived in hard times; she needed impossible blessings; she needed a whole-hearted faith to make it. So God raised the bar; a half-hearted faith wouldn't do; he set the widow up to give her an impossible faith. He has Elijah ask: "First make a cake for me; and then make something for yourself." First for God, and then for yourself. No half-hearted faith allowed; put it all, all your needs, all your trust in God's hands. Give God a chance to show what he can do.

When we look at our lesson we might think, "God really put that widow on the spot." But really God put himself on the spot. With his promise He put himself on the line to be tested. And God proved himself faithful. As we go through life, God will test our faith also. He will test us with hardship that seems impossible to overcome; he will test us with expectations that seem impossible to meet. But as we see today - our God makes the impossible possible. So when life seems impossible ... when God seems impossible ... remember the widow of Zarephath – remember – the Lord provides the impossible – the Lord makes the impossible possible. Amen.



FIRST READING 1 Kings 17:7–16

I have directed a widow there to supply you with food." So he went to Zarephath. When he came to the town gate, a widow was there gathering sticks. He called to her and asked, "Would you bring me a little water in a jar so I may have a drink?" As she was going to get it, he called, "And bring me, please, a piece of bread."

"As surely as the LORD your God lives," she replied, "I don't have any bread—only a handful of flour in a jar and a little olive oil in a jug. I am gathering a few sticks to take home and make a meal for myself and my son, that we may eat it—and die."

Elijah said to her, "Don't be afraid. Go home and do as you have said. But first make a small loaf of bread for me from what you have and bring it to me, and then make something for yourself and your son. For this is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: 'The jar of flour will not be used up and the jug of oil will not run dry until the day the LORD sends rain on the land.'"

She went away and did as Elijah had told her. So there was food every day for Elijah and for the woman and her family. For the jar of flour was not used up and the jug of oil did not run dry, in keeping with the word of the LORD spoken by Elijah.

SECOND READING 2 Corinthians 8:1–9

Entirely on their own, they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the Lord's people. So we urged Titus, just as he had earlier made a beginning, to bring also to completion this act of grace on your part.

Calling his disciples to him, Jesus said, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. They all gave out of their wealth; but she, out of her poverty, put in everything—all she had to live on."

Precious Lord, all our blessings come from you. Lead us again and again to thank you and then move us to be wise and faithful stewards of your gifts.


