GOSPEL LESSON

Mark 5:21, 35-43

When Jesus had again crossed over by boat to the other side of the lake, a large crowd gathered around him while he was by the lake.

While Jesus was still speaking, some men came from the house of Jairus, the synagogue ruler. "Your daughter is dead," they said. "Why bother the teacher anymore?"

Ignoring what they said, Jesus told the synagogue ruler, "Don't be afraid; just believe."

He did not let anyone follow him except Peter, James and John the brother of James. When they came to the home of the synagogue ruler, Jesus saw a commotion, with people crying and wailing loudly. He went in and said to them, "Why all this commotion and wailing? The child is not dead but asleep." But they laughed at him.

After he put them all out, he took the child's father and mother and the disciples who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, *"Talitha koum!"* (which means, *"Little girl, I say to you, get up!"*). Immediately the girl stood up and walked around (she was twelve years old). At this they were completely astonished. He gave strict orders not to let anyone know about this, and told them to give her something to eat.

NICENE CREED

SERMON

Mark 5:21, 35-43

Have you ever walked the lake path around Lake Geneva? This past week we did some of that on the Raddatz family vacation. Walking along, looking out to the lake, you see sail boats and speed boats; a look of peace and fun, the look of a perfect vacation day. Looking up from the lake, you see houses and mansions with a look that says: "We've got it made," a look of life made right. But when you look closer, what do you see? Paint peels even on the best of houses. Out in the yards, red fire hydrants, just in case. Here and there around the lake, red and white emergency boats, just in case. Because even where life is at its best, life is on the edge of life at its worst. When life is at its worst, when bad news and trouble come our way, what are we to do? Let's see what Jairus and Jesus show us!

What would you do if you were in Jairus' shoes? You're a synagogue ruler, a member of the church council responsible for the church services and church business. That means you're a success, a leader, important, and highly respected; not just in the synagogue, but throughout the community. Yet that doesn't matter right now. You're a

parent, the proud and loving father of a child – a 12-year-old daughter. But your little girl is dying; she's on her death bed, near the end. Your heart is breaking; your world is falling apart. What do you do?

What do you do?

Jairus knew what to do. He goes to Jesus, falls on his knees, begs Jesus, "My little daughter is dying. Please come and put your hands on her so that she will be healed and live." And how does Jesus deal with Jairus' crisis? Mark puts it short and simple -- "so Jesus went with him." Jesus made himself available, ready to step in at the right time, in the right way.

Sounds good for Jairus, doesn't it? But what about us? What do we get to know? When we face trouble in our lives, Jesus makes himself available for us too. Your crisis, your trouble, might be sickness as in our lesson; it might be a festering family problem; or it might not be a crisis at all, but the brooding feeling of being a failure, of being forgotten. Whatever your trouble, Jesus is making himself available, ready to step in and step up for you.

In what situations, in the face of what troubles, is Jesus willing to step in for you? In what situations, in what troubles, might we be reluctant to turn to Jesus?

What are some ways that we might call on Jesus to step in and step up for us?

Sounds good, doesn't it? But what so often happens? Instead of seeing and feeling Jesus step in and step up, things stay the same. Or, like with Jairus, things go from bad to worse. At times like that, it can be so easy to think that Jesus has forgotten us or turned his back on us or even turned against us. It's so easy to get frustrated with Jesus, disappointed in Jesus, angry with Jesus, so easy to give up on Jesus.

Is it acceptable to express frustration or disappointment with Jesus?

Can you imagine what was going through Jairus' head? He has Jesus coming along with him, but the crowds are making it so slow. He has Jesus coming along with him, but then Jesus stops for someone else. Can you imagine the tug of war in Jairus' heart? First, the tug of fear: "Let's go, my daughter is dying." Then, the tug of relief: "Yes, Jesus is coming to save my girl." Then that tug of impatience, "Let's go!" Then a tug of relief, "Jesus is with me." Then the tug of desperation, "Come on, Jesus, let's go!" Then a sigh, a gulp of relief, remembering "Jesus." Ever gone through that tug of war?

What do you hear as you go through that tug-of-war?

Jesus didn't have to put Jairus through that, did he? He could have healed Jairus' daughter long-distance; he could have made it so that the little girl never got sick. But Jesus didn't do that, did he? Why not? Looking ahead, what do we see with Jesus? He had something bigger and better in mind for Jairus and his daughter than a long-distance healing, something even better than never getting sick. That something bigger and better that Jesus had for Jairus and his daughter, it would take some time. That something bigger and better would mean some hurt and heartache first. But Jesus knew what he was doing. Even if it didn't look like it or feel like it.

Jairus is going through his tug of war between hope and desperation. And then what? The news goes from bad to worse: **"Your daughter is dead. Why bother the Teacher any longer?**" Jairus' daughter is dead. The people around him figure, "Forget about Jesus; why bother? It's too late; what can Jesus do?" "Why bother Jesus? What can he do?" Ever feel that way? Listen to what Jesus had for Jairus, and what he has for you. It was just what Jairus needed. It wasn't a wave of his hand, a wink, a miracle. No, it was a promise, an unspoken promise, a promise between the lines: "**Don't be afraid; just believe**."

What do you hear as the promise between the lines?

We hear that and what might we think? "Words, more words? I need more than words; I need action. 'Jesus, heal my blank. Make my blank right. Stop my blank."" Jesus could have. Jesus could have stopped Jairus' daughter from dying; he could have made it so there was no bad news for Jairus to hear, no trouble in his life. And Jesus could shield us from any and all bad news and trouble. So why doesn't he? Because I need a measure of bad news and trouble in my life. Why? When life is good without any bad news or trouble, it's so easy to be content with this life and this world. When life is good without any real bad news or trouble, it's so easy to think that we can make it on our own without God. When life is good without any bad news or trouble, it's too easy to forget who we are - sinners who have broken God's law, sinners under God's judgment not just the judgment of bad news and trouble today, but the fires and judgment of hell forever. Under God's judgment, I need something more than just a fix for today's bad news and trouble; I need to be made right with God, or else. To take all the bad news and trouble out of my life would hide me, would hide us from the truth of how desparately we need God. It would be like handing out band-aids and aspirins to the passengers on a sinking cruise ship and saying: "Don't worry. Be happy. All's good!"

In what ways can trouble be good for us?

But God didn't send his Son to hand out band-aids and aspirin. He didn't send Jesus just to wave a wand over our troubles. Instead God sent Jesus to go to the root of the problem. To take our sin as his own, to take the world's sin as his own, and so to take the judgment we deserve as his own. That's what Jesus did at the cross. He stepped in, took our wrong, and set us right with God. How can we know? Not by how many good days we have; not by how many bad days we have. We know Jesus has made things right for us, because of what God did for Jesus. God didn't and he isn't treating Jesus as wrong or as a failure. He's treating Jesus as right, as a success, as a winner, as the Son he loves. How so? He raised Jesus back to life and he set him at his right hand in heaven to rule. Now get this - that life that Jesus has today, that's the life we get to look forward to - life made right, life the way it's supposed to be with God in heaven forever. I know I'm looking forward to that life. And to help us look forward on the bad days, Jesus gives us our lesson with his promise between the lines: "Don't be afraid; just believe."

How is Jesus enjoying his Father's favor today? What do you imagine that to be like? In what ways is that the life that God has for you?

"Don't be afraid; just believe." What's the promise between the lines? Jesus saying: "I'm here for you." What does "I'm here for you" look like? In our lesson, it looked like Jesus working a miracle, doing the impossible. Jairus' daughter was dead. The funeral show had already started. The mourners were mourning; the wailers were wailing; the cryers were crying. But that didn't stop Jesus; Jesus didn't bail just because things looked bad. No, "Jesus took [the little girl] by the hand and said to her, `talitha koum.'" Aramaic words for "Little girl, I say to you, get up!" You know what happened. "Immediately the girl stood up and walked around."

In your experience, what is helpful and unhelpful funeral etiquette or behavior?

Today, Jesus is still promising: "Don't be afraid; just believe; I'm here for you." And how does he show himself today? Perhaps in a miracle. Or perhaps though doctors and medicines, through chemo and radiation, perhaps through vaccinations or vitamins and vegetables. He might keep his promise with an invisible hand stopping a horrific accident. Or he might keep his promise with those invisible hands that take us from this life to heaven. Some days that promise: "I'm here for you" works the calm that soothes our panic. Some says his promise works the strength that keeps us going. "Don't be afraid; just believe; I'm here for you" doesn't mean a life with no trouble today. But "don't be afraid, just believe; I'm here for you" does mean he will get you to that life where there is no trouble; no pain or heartache, no sickness or death.


So when bad news comes our way, what do we get to remember? We get to hear Jesus: "Don't be afraid; just believe; I'm here for you." Amen.


