Sermon followed by Service

September 19, 2021

James 3:13-18

Who's the smartest, the wisest, person you know? There are people who could come into this room not knowing any of us, and after an hour or two of mingling could call each of us by name. There are people who can read a page and then recite it back word-for-word. There are people who can add, subtract, multiply, and divide all at the same time, all in their heads, faster than I can use a calculator. And there are people who can do none of that, but they know how things work, they know how people work, and they have a way of making things work, a way of bringing people together. There are people who can walk in, and see what's wrong, see who's wrong, see what needs to change, see who needs to change, just like that.

Wouldn't it be great to have some of those smartest, wisest people - or maybe just one of those smartest, wisest people - on your team? It depends, doesn't it? It depends on what they do with their smarts and their wisdom; it depends on how they use their smarts and wisdom, doesn't it? I imagine that most all of us can think of some really smart people who caused some really big hurt, can't we? It's not good enough to be the smartest, the wisest, or even the rightest person in the room. It matters how we use our smarts, doesn't it?

What examples would you use to illustrate this truth?

So, who's the smartest, wisest person you know? Sometimes we'd like to think it's me; me as in me, myself, and I. No matter how humble we are, no matter how ignorant we are, we all have times when we think we know better. We have all thought that we know better than our parents, right? We have all thought that we know better than our teachers, right? We have all thought we know better than our neighbors - "Why are they doing that? What are they thinking?" We have all thought we know better than our co-workers - "Don't they know what they're doing? Don't they care?" We have all thought that we know better, better than our governor, our president, our Supreme Court. We could go on; couldn't we?

And, perhaps, you do know better. Perhaps you are smarter, wiser, even righter. But what we do, how we use our smarts, our wisdom, our rightness can

make the difference between success and miserable failure. How we use our smarts can have the angels cheering or the devils cheering. How we use our smarts can show us to be an agent of heaven or an agent of Satan getting in the way of God's good work, even tearing up God's good work.

So how about you? I know that I've been on the wrong side - using my smarts instead of his smarts, my ways instead of his ways. I've had the devils cheering and God's people wincing. How about you? With your smarts, your ways, do you ever have God's people wincing and the devils cheering? It's not always easy to admit, is it? Whether we're right or wrong, our pride gets in the way. And when we're right and for God, our passion for what's right, our passion for God can get in the way. But just because we may be passionate about what's right and making things right, just because we might be passionate about God, that doesn't mean that everything we say and do is right and godly. Just because we're right about something doesn't mean that whatever we say and do about that something is right and godly. It's easy to see that and hear it in other people, not always so easy to see in ourselves, is it?

So what do we do? We don't rely on our self and our own assessment of self - "I'm right so whatever I say and do is right." No, we listen and pay attention to the nudges, the ways Jesus calls us to check our attitudes

How does Jesus nudge us and call us to check our attitudes? How does he call us to repent?

- that nudge, that call to repent might be seen in a tear or a look of fear after we tear into someone; the nudge and call to check our attitude and repent might be some well-spoken or maybe some clumsily-spoken words calling us to change our tone, our attitude, our heart. It's easy to find reasons not to listen and pay attention. But the Psalm-writer didn't say: "Be true to yourself; standup for yourself." No, he wrote: "A broken heart, o God, you do not despise." And neither do we, right? So we swallow our pride and our smarts and we listen to Jesus.

And what does Jesus say? "Peace." Peace. It wasn't just a tossed-off word, easy-come, easy-go. When the world thought itself too smart to listen to God, when the world was insisting on its way, what did Jesus do? He didn't just say: "Peace." He lived peace. He let the world step on him, push him around, judge him wrong. How could he do that? He remembered who he is, where he's from, 2

where he's going, and why he was here. So as they were getting in his face, he took it. As they were nailing him to the cross, he prayed: "**Father, forgive them**." As they were messing with his mind, instead of striking back, he took it. He took, not just what they had for him, but he took what God had for him. He took their guilt and our guilt, your guilt and my guilt; he took God's anger, God's judgment - the anger and judgment we had coming for our self-smart, self-righteous ways; he stepped in and paid the price so that we don't have to. Oh, he could have let loose on the world, let loose against the world, instead he let loose into his Father's hands - "**Father, into your hands I commit my spirit**." And his Father didn't let him down. Today that Jesus lives with a promise for you. He answers our guilt: "Peace, I forgive you."

As Christians following Jesus, we are called to a life of injustice and persecution, a life in which the world will step on us, push us, and judge us. How might Satan twist that truth in the hearts of the abused?

Peace. Hearing the all-holy Jesus share peace instead of anger and judgment, hearing Jesus share peace when we know we deserve to hear judgment, hearing Jesus share peace changes the way we use our smarts, it changes the way we think about our rightness, doesn't it?

How might Jesus' message of peace affect the way we use our smarts and think about our rightness?

So who's the smartest, wisest person you know? You have him living inside of you. You have his Spirit living inside you to make you wise with the wisdom of Jesus himself. So when James asks: "Who is wise and understanding among you?" we don't get to duck and hide. We get to answer James' call: "Show [your wisdom] by your good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom."

What does that mean for us? We don't show our wisdom by spouting off. We don't show our wisdom by winning arguments. We don't show our wisdom by getting our way. But we show our wisdom by what we do, by acting with a wisdom that isn't about me and what I want or think. We show our wisdom by doing good with the wisdom of heaven. How did James put it? "**The wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere**." That's not the easy way, is it? And - how do I say it? - being nice doesn't always get the results we think we need. It's easier to show off my wisdom with a big mouth. It's easier to show myself how smart I am by cutting other people down. It's easier to show my wisdom by fighting, arguing, winning. Sometimes it seems easier to get results by cracking a whip.

Can you think of times God showed his wisdom by fighting, arguing, winning? Can you think of times Jesus showed his wisdom by cracking the whip? When might it be time for us to fight, argue, win, even "crack the whip"? What cautions will we want to keep in mind?

That's another reason James calls for humility - not just humility before each other, but humility before God - it's so easy to think our way to get results is better than his way. But we're not here to get our results; we're here to show him [Jesus]. That means some days the world will treat us like it treated Jesus. But that's OK, because in heaven, God will treat us with Jesus forever.

Friends, we live in a time that calls for wisdom. Let's use the wisdom of heaven - and show off Jesus. Amen.

FIRST READING

Numbers 12:1-15

Miriam and Aaron learn the importance of humble leadership.

Miriam and Aaron began to talk against Moses because of his Cushite wife, for he had married a Cushite. ² "Has the LORD spoken only through Moses?" they asked. "Hasn't he also spoken through us?" And the LORD heard this.

³ (Now Moses was a very humble man, more humble than anyone else on the face of the earth.)

⁴ At once the LORD said to Moses, Aaron and Miriam, "Come out to the tent of meeting, all three of you." So the three of them went out. ⁵ Then the LORD came down in a pillar of cloud; he stood at the entrance to the tent and summoned Aaron and Miriam. When the two of them stepped forward, ⁶ he said, "Listen to my words:

"When there is a prophet among you, I, the LORD, reveal myself to them in visions, I speak to them in dreams.
"But this is not true of my servant Moses; he is faithful in all my house.
With him I speak face to face, clearly and not in riddles; he sees the form of the LORD.
Why then were you not afraid to speak against my servant Moses?"

⁹The anger of the LORD burned against them, and he left them.

¹⁰When the cloud lifted from above the tent, Miriam's skin was leprous^[a] it became as white as snow. Aaron turned toward her and saw that she had a defiling skin disease, ¹¹ and he said to Moses, "Please, my lord, I ask you not to hold against us the sin we have so foolishly committed. ¹²Do not let her be like a stillborn infant coming from its mother's womb with its flesh half eaten away."

¹³So Moses cried out to the LORD, "Please, God, heal her!"

¹⁴ The LORD replied to Moses, "If her father had spit in her face, would she not have been in disgrace for seven days? Confine her outside the camp for seven days; after that she can be brought back." ¹⁵ So Miriam was confined outside the camp for seven days, and the people did not move on till she was brought back.

James teaches that true wisdom shows itself in deeds of humility.

Who is wise and understanding among you? Let them show it by their good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom. ¹⁴But if you harbor bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not boast about it or deny the truth. ¹⁵Such "wisdom" does not come down from heaven but is earthly, unspiritual, demonic. ¹⁶For where you have envy and selfish ambition, there you find disorder and every evil practice.

¹⁷ But the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure; then peaceloving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere. ¹⁸ Peacemakers who sow in peace reap a harvest of righteousness.

Mark 9:30-37

Jesus uses a little child as an example of the kind of humility he wants from those who follow him.

They left that place and passed through Galilee. Jesus did not want anyone to know where they were, ³¹ because he was teaching his disciples. He said to them, "The Son of Man is going to be delivered into the hands of men.

They will kill him, and after three days he will rise." ³² But they did not understand what he meant and were afraid to ask him about it.

³³ They came to Capernaum. When he was in the house, he asked them, "What were you arguing about on the road?" ³⁴ But they kept quiet because on the way they had argued about who was the greatest.

³⁵ Sitting down, Jesus called the Twelve and said, "Anyone who wants to be first must be the very last, and the servant of all."

³⁶ He took a little child whom he placed among them. Taking the child in his arms, he said to them, ³⁷ "Whoever welcomes one of these little children in my name welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me does not welcome me but the one who sent me."
