Sermon followed by Service

September 3, 2023

It's Labor Day weekend. Some time this weekend, someone here is going to grill. How do you like your burgers? Cooked or halfcooked? And for dessert, we'll have brownies and chocolate chip cookies. How do you like your brownies? Full-baked or half-baked? How about your chocolate chip cookies? Full-baked crispy or halfbaked chewy? Some things are all right half-baked, half-done, aren't they? How about half-baked chicken or half-baked turkey? Not so good. Today we hear of something else that's not so good half-done half-hearted appreciation, half-hearted thanksgiving, half-hearted following God, half-hearted living with God.

In our lesson, Elisha is on his death-bed. He's been God's prophet and miracle-worker for the people and kings of Israel for 60 some years. He started off by splitting the Jordan River and walking across. He then turned food for 20 into food for a hundred. He raised the dead to life. He healed Naaman of his leprosy. And he's gotten Israel and Israel's kings out of more trouble than they'll ever know. Or maybe that's part of God's judgment on them, that they see over and over how much Elisha did for them, and how often they refused to listen to him, and now they spend an eternity kicking themselves. After years and years of bringing God's blessing and promise to Israel, Elisha is on his deathbed.

Joash, the king of Israel, comes to Elisha to pay his respects. It almost sounds like the king respected, looked up to Elisha. He cries over Elisha, blurting out: "**My father, my father! The chariots and horsemen of Israel**!" Elisha had done so much for Joash and his people, so much for the kings of Israel and the people of Israel before him, that a part of Joash looked up to Elisha. But we know something else about Joash; Joash "did evil in the eyes of the LORD"; he continued in the God-rejecting sins of the kings before him. For as much as Joash looked up to Elisha, he wouldn't let Elisha's words cook all the way through his heart. He couldn't be bothered to really listen to Elisha and follow the LORD.

The LORD knew that; so did Elisha. But that didn't stop the LORD or Elisha from reaching out and offering great promise and blessing to Joash. From his deathbed, Elisha tells Joash: "Get a bow and some arrows." Even on his deathbed, Elisha is in charge. He tells the king: "Take the bow." He then puts his hand over the king's hand holding the bow. He tells the king: "Open the east window ... now shoot." You can imagine the king wondering, "What's all this about?" Elisha told him: "The LORD's arrow of victory, the arrow of victory over Aram! You will completely destroy the Arameans at Aphek." This wasn't just a crack-pot telling the future; this wasn't just a hope, a wish. Elisha was the man of God, the prophet of the LORD, who with the LORD had worked so many miracles for Israel, who had saved the kings and armies of Israel time and again - Elisha with the LORD was promising Joash victory over Syria, and not just a skin of the teeth victory, but "you will completely destroy the Arameans at Aphek."

Put yourself in the room with Elisha and the king. You know what Elisha has done in the past; you know how he keeps his word and promises. And now Elisha - with the shot of an arrow - promises victory over your enemy, the bully who has been kicking you around for years. We want more of that kind of blessing, don't we? And Elisha and the LORD have more of that for Joash. Elisha tells Joash to take the rest of the arrows and to strike the ground with them. Shooting the first arrow meant the promise of a great victory for Joash. What else does Elisha and the LORD have in store with the rest of the arrows? We want to know, don't we? So what does Joash do with the rest of the arrows? He strikes the ground 3 times. Elisha is hot: "Just three times?! You should have struck the ground five or six times. Then you would have completely destroyed Aram. Now you will defeat Aram only 3 times."

After the great promise that Elisha had for Joash with the first arrow, why did Joash strike the ground only 3 times with the rest of the arrows? Why such a half-hearted response? Was Joash too proud, too embarrassed, to really get into what Elisha was telling him? Was Joash too wrapped up in his own thinking to think about what promise God had for him? Was Joash too busy, too lazy, too much stuck on self to offer up anything more than a half-hearted response?

Perhaps you're thinking: "How do we know it was a halfhearted response?" Because the LORD judged it to be a half-hearted response.

And so Joash and his people lost out. God was ready to promise them more and bless them more, but Joash with his halfhearted response left God's blessing and promise on the table.

Makes one wonder, doesn't it? In our Gospel lesson, Jesus promises: "Ask and it will be given you, seek and you will find, knock and the door will be opened unto you." Do you notice the increase in intensity? "Ask, seek, knock!" How much blessing do we miss out on because we don't ask? How much blessing do we miss out on when our prayers are half-hearted? Makes one wonder, doesn't it? How are your finances? Part of me tells me: "You better watch out; things are going bad." Another part of me tells me: "You better keep up, catch up; they're having more fun than you." You know what I mean? With part of me thinking this, and part of me thinking that, what so easily can happen to our giving, our financial partnership with the LORD? So, let me ask: "How are your finances? How is your giving?" Full-hearted generous or half-hearted worried and distracted? **"Whoever sows sparingly will reap sparingly; whoever sows generously will reap generously.**" Makes me wonder: How much blessing do we miss out on because of halfhearted giving?

It's not just about money and stuff. How is your heart? Not, how is your heart pumping? But, how is your heart and mind at peace? Jesus says: "**Come to me all you who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest**." Not just for this hour, but during the week, what kind of quality time do you have talking to Jesus, listening to Jesus in his Word? In other words, how is your home devotion life, your home Bible-reading? Full-hearted or half-hearted and hurried? How much peace and rest and blessing do we miss out on because we come to Jesus and listen to Jesus hurried, distracted, half-hearted? Makes one wonder, doesn't it?

But half-hearted is more dangerous than just missing out on some blessing. In the book of Revelation, what does Jesus say he will do with the luke-warm, the half-hearted? He will spit them out. The danger of a half-hearted life with Jesus isn't just that we miss out on some blessing; the danger of a half-hearted life with Jesus is that we miss out on Jesus.

It's amazing, isn't it? The LORD knew Joash: "He did evil in the eyes of the LORD." Elisha knew it too. And yet, what? The

LORD with Elisha offers up blessing and promise for Joash. And the LORD is ready to do so much more for Joash. And not just for Joash. The LORD was ready to do so much more for the people of Israel, but they would not listen; they would not follow; they wouldn't give God more than a half a heart. And yet God was patient and kind, caring and compassionate. Why? Not because Israel and her kings deserved patience. Not because God is satisfied with half a heart. No, God was patient and kind because he had made a promise to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob; and even if Israel wouldn't hold on to his promise, he would - he would keep his promise.

What about us? Thinking about this sermon this past week was hard. There's a part of me, a part of us, that needs to hear - halfhearted ministry, half-hearted prayer, half-hearted love for God doesn't save us any time, any money, any energy. Half-hearted ministry, half-hearted prayer, half-hearted love for God costs us because a half-hearted life before God leaves God's blessings on the table. I need to hear that; we all need to hear that. At the same time, what do we see in our lesson? A God who wants to bless. A God with great promises. A God who wants to bless you, and work great promises for you.

And so what does God do? He doesn't just say: "Good enough," like half-hearted is good enough. And he doesn't just spit us out like he can't stand us. No, he gives us Jesus; he counts us with Jesus; he covers us with Jesus and his whole-hearted life. Can you think of a time when Jesus ever did anything half-hearted? He loved and lived for God with his whole being. He loved his neighbors, not just as he loved himself, but more than he loved himself. Look at the cross; that's where we see his whole-hearted life, his whole-hearted love, the best. There he worked God's plan to forgive us. There he took your place and my place as someone to be spit out by God. Yes, Jesus took our place being spit out by God. But instead of turning against God, or quitting on God, or giving up on God, Jesus gave his whole heart and whole life to God. And what did God do? He counted Jesus as right and raised him back to life.

You have that life, Jesus' life, as yours. In your baptisms God covers our half-hearted praying and singing with the voice of Jesus. He covers our half-hearted giving with the giving of Jesus. He covers our half-hearted life with the whole-hearted life of Jesus. He counts the whole-hearted life that Jesus lived - loving God with all his heart, loving and doing good with all his heart - God counts Jesus' wholehearted life as yours, calling you right for life with him today and right for life with him forever in heaven.

What do we do with that? Sadly, some will coast into halfhearted living and get spit out even after all that Jesus has done for them. But some - I'm talking about you! - we won't settle for a halfhearted life with God, will we? No, this is the life we set our hearts on - Every day with Jesus, we set our hearts, our whole hearts, to live for the glory of God. Every day, we set our hearts, our whole hearts, to live for the good of his people. And what do we find? God has more blessing for us than we could ever imagine. God is so good to us! Amen.

DIVINE SERVICE I

IN OUR WORLD TODAY ... we hear the classic "Good enough for government work," and more recently of "quiet-quitting." We even hear "Good enough for church work" and "I don't need to go to church to be a Christian." People used to be ashamed (for the most part) of getting by and going through the motions. Now getting by and going through the motions seems to be a more accepted way of life as our world is more and more comfortable with worship of "self."

IN OUR WORSHIP TODAY ... we hear Jesus and his prophet expect more in our relationship with God, and when we are self-satisfied with less, we should expect less from God. With what God sees from his world (and sometimes his church), isn't it amazing how much blessing and promise he puts before us?

Elisha said, "Get a bow and some arrows," and he did so. "Take the bow in your hands," he said to the king of Israel. When he had taken it, Elisha put his hands on the king's hands.

"Open the east window," he said, and he opened it. "Shoot!" Elisha said, and he shot. "The LORD's arrow of victory, the arrow of victory over Aram!" Elisha declared. "You will completely destroy the Arameans at Aphek."

Then he said, "Take the arrows," and the king took them. Elisha told him, "Strike the ground." He struck it three times and stopped. The man of God was angry with him and said, "You should have struck the ground five or six times; then you would have defeated Aram and completely destroyed it. But now you will defeat it only three times."

Elisha died and was buried...

Hazael king of Aram oppressed Israel throughout the reign of Jehoahaz. But the LORD was gracious to them and had compassion and showed concern for them because of his covenant with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob... Hazael king of Aram died, and Ben-Hadad his son succeeded him as king. Then Jehoash son of Jehoahaz recaptured from Ben-Hadad son of Hazael the towns he had taken in battle from his father Jehoahaz. Three times Jehoash defeated him, and so he recovered the Israelite towns.
