St. John offers an excellent preschool-8th grade school program. We are members of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod (WELS) - www.wels.net.


GATHERING RITE ON HOLY BAPTISM


INVOCATION

M: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.




- M: I tell you the truth, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless he is born of water and the Spirit.
- C: Flesh gives birth to flesh, but the Spirit gives birth to spirit. (John 3:5,6)
- M: Surely we were sinful at birth, sinful from the time our mothers conceived us. (*Psalm 51:5*)
- C: But we were washed, we were sanctified, we were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and by the Spirit of our God. (1 Corinthians 6:11)




M: As baptized children of God, we confess our sins.

C: Holy and merciful Father, I confess that I am by nature sinful and that I have disobeyed you in my thoughts, words, and actions. I have done what is evil and failed to do what is good. For this I deserve your punishment both now and in eternity. But I am truly sorry for my sins, and trusting in my Savior Jesus Christ, I pray: Lord, have mercy on me, a sinner.



M: Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word, and to present her to himself as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless (Ephesians 5:25-27). Therefore, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son (+) and of the Holy Spirit.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

FIRST LESSON Jeremiah 1:4-10

The word of the Lord came to me, saying,

"Before I formed you in the womb I knew you,

before you were born I set you apart;

I appointed you as a prophet to the nations."

"Alas, Sovereign Lord," I said, "I do not know how to speak; I am too young."

But the Lord said to me, "Do not say, 'I am too young.' You must go to everyone I send you to and say whatever I command you. Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you and will rescue you," declares the Lord.

Then the Lord reached out his hand and touched my mouth and said to me, "I have put my words in your mouth. See, today I appoint you over nations and kingdoms to uproot and tear down, to destroy and overthrow, to build and to plant."

GOSPEL LESSON Mark 1:4-13

And so John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. The whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem went out to him. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River. John wore clothing made of camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. And this was his message: "After me comes the one more powerful than I, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. I baptize you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

At that time Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. Just as Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased."

At once the Spirit sent him out into the wilderness, and he was in the wilderness forty days, being tempted by Satan. He was with the wild animals, and angels attended him.

APOSTLES' CREED

I believe in God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day he rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty. From there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Christian Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

SERMON Mark 1:4-13

"Why, God?" "What are you doing, God?" Ever been there? You lose your best friend - "Why, God?" You lose your job - "What are you doing, God?" You get word from the doctor, cancer - "Why, God?" Your child gets sick, so sick and you're so afraid - "What are you doing, God?" Ever been there? "Why, God?" "What are you doing, God?"

At those times, what goes on in here [head/heart]? We might be afraid. We might be angry. We might feel beaten and hopeless. We might cry or yell. We might curl up in a ball or go on a rampage. We might do all of those things. We might think God is against us, that he's punishing us. We might think God has left us. We might wonder: "What good is God? What good is God if he lets this happen?" We might think: "I'm all on my own."

"Why, God? What are you doing, God?" The devil loves those times, doesn't he? You might feel the devil is at work. You might even feel that the devil is right. You might feel like you're in a battle with the devil; you might feel like you're in a battle with God. But those "Why, God? What are you doing, God?" times aren't just the work of the devil, are they? It wasn't the devil who told Abraham to offer up his son, his only son, Isaac. It was God. It wasn't the devil who put Paul in harm's way as missionary to the Gentiles. It was God. And in our lesson, what do we hear? When Jesus was out in the wilderness for those forty days doing battle with Satan, it wasn't because Jesus took a

wrong turn or couldn't find his way out. Jesus was out there with the jackals and the snakes, he was out there with the devil because the Spirit of God led him out there.

Why? God had something he wanted to show Abraham and Isaac - he would provide. God had something he wanted to show Paul and his church - he would deliver. God had something he wanted to do through Jesus - he was going to put the devil in his place.

When God put Abraham through the grinder - "offer up your son" - God wasn't punishing Abraham. When God put Paul through the grinder - beaten, stoned, imprisoned - God wasn't punishing Paul; he didn't leave Paul to fend for himself. When God sent Jesus out into the grinder, out into the wilderness to do battle with Satan - God wasn't sending Jesus off on his own; he didn't leave Jesus to fend for himself. God had his angels there to attend to Jesus.

And Jesus had something more. I'm not talking about Jesus being God. I'm talking about Jesus having God. Before God sent Jesus into the wilderness to do battle with Satan ... before God sent Jesus out into the world ... God empowered Jesus. He empowered Jesus with his Spirit. He empowered Jesus with his promise. How? God had Jesus baptized. Mark doesn't tell us much about Jesus' baptism. But he does make these two points: 1) the Spirit of God landed on Jesus, God gave his Spirit to Jesus in a special way. And 2) God gave this promise to Jesus: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well-pleased." When God put Jesus on the battlefield between good and evil, God didn't send Jesus into battle alone. God sent him powered with his Spirit. And when Jesus was being run through the grinder, Jesus didn't have to wonder where he stood with God. He had God's promise: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well-pleased."

You have that same Spirit! You have that same promise! You don't have to wonder where you stand with God. You aren't alone and on your own. In your baptism, God gave you his Spirit. The same Spirit that God gave Jesus, God has given you to equip you and power you, to shield you and protect you. You aren't alone and on your own. Baptized in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, God put his name on you. In baptism, God has given you his Spirit as his guarantee that he is with you and for you. In baptism, the Spirit has connected you with Jesus so that Jesus' life is your life, his death is your death, his holiness is your holiness, his approval by God is your approval by God. And in baptism, the Father has adopted you as his. Just as the Father said to Jesus: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well-pleased" in baptism you have God saying to you: "You are my son, my daughter, whom I love; with you I am well-pleased."

What a relief to hear ... when we're feeling beaten down and alone, what a relief to hear: "You are my son, my daughter whom I love; with you I am well-pleased!" And what power God has for us ... when we see a battle ahead of us, when we see the grinder ahead of us, God powers us, he empowers us: "You are my son, my daughter, whom I love; with you I am well-pleased." You have the power of God; you have the promise of God; you're in with God!

"So," we might wonder, "why isn't life easier?" It can be easy to think that if life is hard, we must not have the power and promise of God. Thinking that, it can be easy to think that if we're doubting the power and promise of God, we must not have the power and promise of God.

But looking at our lesson, what do we see? Jesus wasn't baptized for a spa treatment. Jesus was baptized for battle. The same thing is true for us. We're not baptized for a life at the spa. We're baptized for battle - so that in our battle between good and evil, in our struggle for the faith, when life is hard and we're put through the grinder, we can know - we're not alone and on our own, we have the power and promise of God!


Having the power and promise of God doesn't mean that life will be easy. And when life isn't easy, that doesn't mean that the power and promise of God aren't at work. In our lesson there's a verse that strikes me as odd: "After John was put in prison, Jesus went into Galilee preaching the good news of God." We heard about this last month, didn't we? God's greatest prophet was thrown into prison. God's people were being used and abused. More and more, society was godless. More and more, the church was graceless. And what does Jesus say? It's not "Why, God?" It's not "What are you doing, God?" Instead, Jesus is preaching the good news: "The kingdom of God is near! Repent and believe the good news!" Jesus knew God would have his way. Jesus knew God's love would win out.


We get to have that same confidence. No matter how much bad news we might have around us ... no matter how much bad news we might feel inside us ... Jesus has his good news - "The Kingdom of God is near!" God will have his way. And God's love will win out for you. Amen.
