Sermon followed by Service

January 15, 2023 - God-Lived Life - 1 1 Peter 2:2-3

What is the God-lived life? The God-lived life is a life of being a disciple, a life that wants to learn more about God, that wants to grow closer to God. The God-lived life is a life that loves to listen to God, that loves God's Word. Today, Peter uses a stronger word. The God-lived life is a life that craves God's Word.

Oh, that word "craves" is a powerful word, isn't it? And it shames me. I'll tell you what I crave - spaghetti and, this past week, Christmas chocolate. I'll tell you what I crave - put my phone in front of me and I just have to know: "What happened? Who said what? What do the internet gods think I want to know; I need to know!" But God's Word? If the preacher's long or boring, la dee da dee da. If I've heard it before, if the Memory Treasure takes work, if I'm too tired, if I'm too needing to get to my work, my thing Oh, I might admire how other people crave, but they must have more time, less to do. I might think - after I get the rest of my life in order, but first "my stuff." I might want to start; I might even start, but God always lets something get in the way. So, "crave the pure milk of the word?" That word "crave" is a powerful word, and it shames me.

So let's just leave it behind. Oh, that sounds like a good idea, doesn't it? Do we get to do that? If God says something we don't like, do we get to just leave it behind and go on our way? We aren't here to go on our way, are we? We're here to leave behind our way and to be on Jesus' way. Like the tax collector in Jesus' parable, we're here broken and contrite before God - "God, have mercy on me a sinner." Like that tax collector, we're here for God's mercy, God's

blessing. We're here for God's new start, God's new day. We're here to live the God-lived life, right?

What does the God-lived life look like? The God-lived life looks like Jesus. The God-lived life looks like Jesus when he's twelve years old. Mary and Joseph take Jesus to the temple in Jerusalem. As they're heading back home, Jesus stays back in Jerusalem. He's not out and about exploring big-city Jerusalem; he's at the temple. He's not just checking out the massive Temple complex that Herod built; Jesus is talking with the Bible teachers, asking his questions, digging into God's Word. For hours and days, he's digging into God's Word, asking his questions, connecting the dots, seeing his place in God's Word.

Then we see Jesus, 30 year's old, just after he's baptized. What did we say last week? - he's supercharged by the Spirit of God who then leads Jesus out into the wilderness for this purpose - to do battle with Satan. And what do we hear? Satan tempting, twisting God's Word, offering to satisfy Jesus' human hunger for food, offering to satisfy our human craving for glory and the good life, to make life easy for Jesus. And what does Jesus do? He takes the Word he's been digging into; he wields the Word as a weapon against Satan; Jesus cuts through Satan's lies, and puts Satan in his place, with the Word of God.

Then we see Jesus at the Sermon on the Mount expounding, explaining God's Law. He knows how people - can I say "we"? Jesus knows how we like to find loopholes around God's Law, shortcuts through God's Law, holes that empty God's Law. He knows how people like to re-write God's Word, God's Way, to fit their own word and way. And what does Jesus do? Jesus doubles down. Jesus doesn't make the Law easier; he shows the Law to be

tougher, stricter, more demanding, and more condemning; he shows God's Word to be just what we need.

And then we hear Jesus with his Bible in his heart, and this time he points to the cross. "Jesus took the Twelve aside and told them, 'We are going up to Jerusalem, and everything that is written by the prophets about the Son of Man will be fulfilled. He will be handed over to the Gentiles. They will mock him, insult him, spit on him, flog him and kill him." And what did Jesus do? He didn't do "the loophole, shortcut, leave God's Word behind to do my own thing" thing. No, Jesus set his life on doing what God's Word gave him to do; he set his life on sacrifice and went to the cross.

Why? To cover over our shortcuts and loopholes, to cover over our twisting and turning of what God says, to cover over our la dee da dee da. To pay the price for the times we try to shut God up and cut God off. You know how angry you get when people tell you to shut up, when people intentionally cut you off mid-sentence? Can you imagine how righteously upset God could be with us? But Jesus took our place and took what we would have coming from an angry and condemning God. Now, you get to hear God's favorite Words: "Come to me. Relax. I've got this; I've got you. I've got your past forgiven; I've got you forgiven. I have a place for you in my heart; I have a place for you in my heaven." Those favorite words of God - they sound so good, don't they?

They sound so good that when Peter says: "Crave" them, we don't see that as some imposition - God imposing on us - do we? And when God invites us in to hear his secrets, the secrets of his love, the secrets of heaven, we don't think that some hardship, do we? And when God doesn't just text us "Ivya," but gives us a whole Bible to speak to us, comfort us, guide us, inspire us, power us ... that's why

Peter says: "Like new-born babies, crave the pure milk of the word, now that you have tasted that the Lord is good."

We're taking a break from what we've been doing. We're starting a new day, a new start with our Bibles. We're taking a break from all the other stuff going on in our lives. We're starting a new day, a new start with our Bibles. We're starting a new day, a new start listening and learning what God wants to say to me, to you. We're taking a break from all the other stuff we think we need to be doing, to let God do, to let God do what he sees we need in us.

That's why we're asking you to start new with us on Sunday mornings - a new start with the basics of what we teach and why we teach what we teach. Then during the week, a new start together, a new start with your Bible or a devotion, or a new start praying. Maybe you've heard that before. Here's something you maybe haven't heard - tell us what you're doing, what you're reading, what you're learning, what you're praying. And ask us, encourage us, yes, even challenge us - to do what? To be like those sheep - listening to the Shepherd, following the Shepherd, living the God-lived life of a Disciple listening to the Word of Jesus. Amen.

Now that you have purified yourselves by obeying the truth so that you have sincere love for each other, love one another deeply, from the heart. For you have been born again, not of perishable seed, but of imperishable, through the living and enduring word of God. For,

"All people are like grass, and all their glory is like the flowers of the field; the grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of the Lord endures forever."

Therefore, rid yourselves of all malice and all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and slander of every kind. Like newborn babies, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation, now that you have tasted that the Lord is good.

Proverbs 1:7

Alleluia. The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge, but fools despise wisdom and instruction. Alleluia.

GOSPEL Luke 18:9–17

To some who were confident of their own righteousness and looked down on everyone else, Jesus told this parable: "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.'

"But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.'

"I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

People were also bringing babies to Jesus for him to place his hands on them. When the disciples saw this, they rebuked them. But Jesus called the children to him and said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. Truly I tell you, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it."

BIBLE STUDY

2 Chronicles 34:1-2, 14-21, 29-33

¹ Josiah was eight years old when he became king, and he reigned in Jerusalem thirty-one years. ² He did what was right in the eyes of the LORD and followed the ways of his father David, not turning aside to the right or to the left.

¹⁴ While they were bringing out the money that had been taken into the temple of the LORD, Hilkiah the priest found the Book of the Law of the LORD that had been given through Moses. ¹⁵ Hilkiah said to Shaphan the secretary, "I have found the Book of the Law in the temple of the LORD." He gave it to Shaphan.

¹⁶ Then Shaphan took the book to the king and reported to him: "Your officials are doing everything that has been committed to them.

¹⁷ They have paid out the money that was in the temple of the LORD and have entrusted it to the supervisors and workers." ¹⁸ Then Shaphan the secretary informed the king, "Hilkiah the priest has given me a book." And Shaphan read from it in the presence of the king.

¹⁹ When the king heard the words of the Law, he tore his robes. ²⁰ He gave these orders to Hilkiah, Ahikam son of Shaphan, Abdon son of Micah, Shaphan the secretary and Asaiah the king's attendant: ²¹ "Go and inquire of the LORD for me and for the remnant in Israel and Judah about what is written in this book that has been found. Great is the LORD's anger that is poured out on us because those who have gone before us have not kept the word of the LORD; they have not acted in accordance with all that is written in this book."

²⁹ Then the king called together all the elders of Judah and Jerusalem. ³⁰ He went up to the temple of the LORD with the people of Judah, the inhabitants of Jerusalem, the priests and the Levites—all the people from the least to the greatest. He read in their hearing all the words of the Book of the Covenant, which had been found in the temple of the LORD. ³¹ The king stood by his pillar and renewed the covenant in the presence of the LORD—to follow the LORD and keep his commands, statutes and decrees with all his heart and all his soul, and to obey the words of the covenant written in this book.

³² Then he had everyone in Jerusalem and Benjamin pledge themselves to it; the people of Jerusalem did this in accordance with the covenant of God, the God of their ancestors.

³³ Josiah removed all the detestable idols from all the territory belonging to the Israelites, and he had all who were present in Israel serve the LORD their God. As long as he lived, they did not fail to follow the LORD, the God of their ancestors.

INTRODUCTION

How quickly the Word was lost in Judah! It had only been two generations since good king Hezekiah reigned! What can you think of that was valued in the past and no longer has the same value today? Why is that the case?

INTO THE TEXT

- 1. In verse 19, we see the law cut King Josiah to the heart when he tore his robes. However, fear of the law is not what motivated a change in behavior. We see that motivation in verse 32. Describe it.
- 2. What were the effects of the Word of God on the people?

APPLYING IT

- 1. Often in our everyday lives, we see the law motivate behavior but not change hearts. Give examples.
- 2. In what ways can people see that the gospel has impacted your life?
- 3. What can we do to ensure the Word is treasured for generations to come?
- 4. Look at your challenge card. How do each of those suggested commitments work toward this goal?
