Sermon followed by Service

January 8, 2023

Acts 10:34-43

Day 7 of the new year. I don't know about you, but I could use a new year, a new start, a new day. How about you?

In our lesson, Peter, Jewish Peter, was living a new day. Peter had grown up in a Jewish world that saw the rest of the world, the Gentile world, as unclean. As a Jewish disciple of Jesus, he saw Jesus as of the Jews and for the Jews, and with his background he didn't seem to think much beyond that, yet. But now was a new day. The Spirit of God stepped in and opened Peter's eyes - his mind and heart - to see that Jesus is for all people - not just for Jews, but also for Gentiles. That truth would have been in the back of Peter's mind, but it seems to have gotten lost, or maybe suppressed.

That happens, doesn't it? We know Jesus is for all, but sometimes it can be hard to think that Jesus is for those people. Sometimes is can be hard to think of ourselves as sharing Jesus, or doing anything, with those people. And so we put a lid on thinking Jesus might be for those people, because, well ... why? When we put a lid on thinking that Jesus might be for them, is it because of them? Or because of us and our comfort zone, or worse?

Today was a new day for Peter. The Spirit of God had made it clear to Peter that Jesus is for all people. And so what did Peter do on this new day? He lived new! He put God's Word and God's Truth into practice. He stepped out of his comfort zone. He lived new. He's in the house of a Gentile, sharing Jesus with Gentiles. Here's something that struck me. On this new day for Peter, Peter highlights a new day in the life of Jesus. As Peter shares Jesus, we don't hear of Christmas, the Wise Men, Jesus' flight to Egypt; we don't hear of Jesus growing up and growing in favor with God and man. Peter starts off with Jesus baptized. Jesus is about 30 years old. It's time for Jesus to step up and step in, to go public as Messiah, to bring God's kingdom work to the world around him. It's time for a new day in Jesus' life and work. So what did Jesus do? Jesus listened to his Father, our Father. And the Father had Jesus go to John the Baptizer to be baptized. Baptized with water and the Word, Jesus heard his Father's voice promise from heaven: "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased." Baptized with water and the Word, Jesus was anointed, super-charged by the Holy Spirit with the power of God.

That can sound perplexing. Jesus is and was the Son of God with the power of God. He is and was the Son of God by whom all things were created. As the Son of God, Jesus has and Jesus had the full power of God at his disposal. But it was a new day for Jesus, a new time for his work. The Father and his Holy Spirit wanted Jesus powered for what was coming. So the Father had his Son go to John the Baptizer to be baptized, and the Holy Spirit supercharged Jesus with the power of God for his new day and new work. Did you notice? Jesus wasn't too proud, too self-centered: "I can do this myself." No, Jesus did what his Father wanted him to do. He humbled himself before John the Baptizer. He was baptized. And he was powered by the Holy Spirit for his new day.

And what did Jesus do? He took God's Word and Power and put it into action. He didn't just mind his own business; he didn't keep his faith to himself. He put himself out there as the Man of God. He went around doing good. He healed the sick. By doing good, by healing the sick, Jesus went to work undoing the work of Satan, undoing the control of Satan.

It should have been a glorious, beautiful time. But the more good Jesus did, the more Jesus healed, the more he shared the Word and Promise of God, the more people turned against him. The thought of that can keep us tucked in our comfort zones, not so? But Jesus knew what he came to do. He came to do our greatest good; he came to heal our greatest sickness. Jesus came to take our sin on himself; he came to take our guilt before God to the cross, and there to pay the price, suffer the curse, endure the judgment, we had coming. For what? For the time we were under Satan's control, for the times we re-surrendered to the control of Satan? For the times we stay stuck tucked in our comfort zone instead of doing the good the Father has for us to do? Yes, for all that and more, Jesus let himself be taken to the cross and killed. Why? So he could hear the Father and echo the judgment of the Father: "You are forgiven, let loose from your sin and guilt. You are justified, right by God; so come and share his happiness!"

How could Jesus do that, go through that, let that happen to himself? Jesus knew the Father's promise - on the third day he would be raised again. Jesus knew the Father's promise: we would be raised, all who believe in Jesus would be raised to life with him. Jesus knew the Father's promise, and in baptism, the Holy Spirit super-charged Jesus to hold on to that promise. And Jesus was not disappointed.

We have a new day ahead of us. We have a new year ahead of us. As a congregation, we have 125 years behind us, and we get to start a new day, a new 125 years ahead of us. Some days the new can look intimidating. Some days, we can prefer to stay stuck in our old comfort zones. Some days, it can seem as if Satan has us under his control, that he's freely doing his thing with us.

In baptism, you have been baptized into a new day. It won't always look like a new day, or feel like a new day, or sound like a new day. But better than our senses, you have this Truth - you have been baptized into the victory of Christ; you have been baptized into the righteousness of Christ; you have been baptized into a new day of life right and together with God.

When Jesus was baptized into his new day, when the Spirit opened Peter's eyes to see the new day that God had for him, what did they do? They stepped in and stepped up to live the new day God had for them. Peter didn't stay stuck in his past comfort zone; both Peter and Jesus stepped out to show and share with the world the Good News that God has for us in Jesus.

That's the new day ahead for us. The Spirit of Christ has put this want, this drive into our hearts and before our congregation. This year we want to challenge each other, we want to challenge ourselves to be like Peter and to leave our comfort zones. This year we want to challenge each other, we want to challenge ourselves to be like Jesus in living the God-Lived Life. This year we want to challenge each other, we want to challenge ourselves to do good into the world around us.

What does that mean? The idea behind that word "do good" isn't just to do right things or nice things, but to meet the needs of the people around us, and so to undo the control of Satan around us, and so to show off the power and promise and love of God, not just to people in our circle, but to all the people around us. Yes, this year want to challenge each other, we want to challenge ourselves to share Jesus with all peoples around us. You heard us talk about this last year - "Everyone a witness."

When I say that we have a new day ahead of us, I'm not saying that doing good and sharing Jesus isn't part of your past or our past, that doing good and sharing Jesus isn't already part of your everyday life. For years, I have seen that new life in so many of you. But I also see how sometimes we struggle to do what we want. And sometimes we struggle to want what Jesus wants. Some days we struggle. Not so?

But this is a new day for us. In your baptism, you are baptized into a new day. Our failures, our shortcomings, our past don't need to hold us back. Satan's control out there doesn't need to hold us back. Our fears inside and the challenges out there don't need to overwhelm us and hold us back. We are baptized and set free from our past; we are baptized and set right with God to live a new day, this new day, with Jesus. We are baptized into the victory of Jesus so that we get to live like conquerors before Satan; yes, we get to live today like winners because baptized into Jesus, we are winners. And when we feel too small for the challenge, we get to remember that in baptism, the Holy Spirit of God has connected you with Christ and supercharged you with the power of God to hold on to his promise and to live this new day - how? - for the glory of God and the good of his people.

Today may not feel like a new day. But today we get to live baptized. We get to live connected to Christ and supercharged by his Spirit to live this day new - here, at home, and out there in the world. Amen.




