Sermon followed by Service

November 14, 2021

Romans 8:28-30

Imagine yourself up in heaven - you and your family and friends. You're sitting around a table, standing in the kitchen, out on the deck, around a campfire - with Jesus and the Father and Spirit. You're telling stories, stories about life here in this world. Not grumble, grouch stories. Not gossip stories. Not stories of sin. No, you're telling stories of grace and glory. Like that time your car wheel came off. You were in such a hurry that day, running late. At the grocery store, leaving the parking lot, about to turn into traffic - thick, busy traffic. And your tire falls off. Not as you're pulling out into that traffic; not where you'll be the next accident; but where you're safe in the parking lot. As you're telling the story, you look up with a smile and say to Jesus and the Father: "Good timing. Thank you." And Jesus says: "We thought so."

You're up in heaven with family and friends, with Jesus and the Father and Spirit. You tell about that year you were in and out of the hospital with cancer, those months in the hospice bed with a wound in your belly that just wouldn't heal. You look to Jesus and his Spirit, and what do you say? "Thank you. Thank you for that time with my family and friends. We had such good talks; thank you for the words we needed to say, the words we needed to hear from each other. Thank you." And Jesus and his Spirit smile back: "We knew it would be good for all of you."

You're up there in heaven; you remember some dark years, miserable years of being bullied and abused and not knowing what to do with it. A friend says: "You knew just what to say in my dark years. God used your dark years so you could help me and so many more in our dark years." With a smile you both turn to Jesus: "Thank you." And with a bigger smile, Jesus answers back: "Well done, good and faithful servant."

One more. You're up there in heaven; across the table you see someone, someone taken from you before you were ready for them to be gone. You know who I'm thinking of? You smile at each other, and you say to the Father: "After he died, after she died, I know I wasn't always easy to listen to, but thank you." And as the Father sees you together again, he smiles and says: "It wasn't easy for me either; but it's so good to have you all home." Stories of grace and glory.

Do you have similar stories of grace and glory - God working all things together for your good? What can help us to see and remember such stories from our lives?

I know some of you can see and tell stories of grace and glory like that right now. And some of us, for some of us, seeing and remembering the grace and glory isn't always easy. Sometimes we might feel so stuck in the dark, so surrounded by the dark, that we don't see the grace and glory God is working. For those dark times, the Holy Spirit shines some light - "all things work together for good."

I've had people ask me: "How do I know that promise is true for me? I'm not seeing it." And then they wonder aloud: "Maybe God doesn't see my love for him; maybe God does see my love for him. My love for God is such a mess, the things I've said and done. Paul says, 'all things work together for good for those who love God.' With the way I love God, no wonder my life is such a mess."

How have you heard Satan try to steal or invalidate this promise?

What do you say to that? "It's good to be thinking about loving God instead of just getting from God, isn't it?" "It's good to recognize, confess, admit our wrong, our guilt, the messes we've made, instead of just blaming God for what's wrong in our lives. And it's good to join Paul: 'What a wretch I am! The good I want to do, I don't do; the evil I don't want to do, I keep on doing. What a wretch I am! Who will save me from this body of death?!' And it's good to hear Paul: "There is now no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus." Not because we love God, but because God loves you with Jesus. Before we loved him, while we were still fighting against him, God took our God-fighting, our Godhating guilt, and, yes, he took our mixed-up, messed-up love Jesus took it all to the cross, and there with perfect love, he paid the price - for you, for me, for the whole wide world out there. In Jesus, you are forgiven full and free. In Jesus, God isn't holding the failure of our love against us. Instead, in Jesus, he is holding you and covering you with his love. And what does God's love do in us? It works in us a growing love for God. A growing love for God that joins Paul this way: "Thanks be to God - through Jesus Christ our Lord!" It's good to be thinking about loving God instead of just getting from God, isn't it?

If the trouble in my life has me evaluating my love for God, what might that be a sign of?

I got a little off track, didn't I? We were talking stories of grace and glory. What does Paul say about grace and glory? "You know that all things work together for good." "All things." Not just things that look good, sound good, feel good; not just things that make us smile, but all things - including the worst and darkest this world can throw at you. "All things work together for our good." Not by randomness, not by luck, not by chance, but how? - by the plan and purpose of our God.

When we look out at the world, when we read our world's science books, it can be hard to see a grand plan and purpose. Instead, life can look and feel like a giant accident - sometimes an accident looking and feeling wonderful, more and more like an accident looking and feeling darker and darker with hurt and heartache. Paul reminds us that we aren't living an accident! From before all creation God has a plan and a purpose for you! From before all creation - that's Ephesians 1 - God knew you. He didn't just have knowledge of you; he knew you in his heart to be his. And so he chose you, he predestined you, that is, he marked you and put his fence around you to be his. Not because before all time God looked ahead into our lives, saw us come to faith, saw what we would do for him - and that's why he chose us. No, God did not choose us because he fore-saw some good in us. No, this is why God chose you. The Father looked at his Son Jesus and chose you to make you good like Jesus. Why? So that he could have a family to love.

What does Scripture teach us about how and why God chooses?

From before time and now in time, God has been working his story, nudging and shaping world history, nudging and shaping church history, nudging and shaping your history. Nudging and shaping history - working the good, the bad, and the ugly together - to put you in the right place at the right time so you could hear Jesus' call: "Come to me, listen to me, believe me, follow me." In the same way, he's worked history - his story and your story - to connect you to his promise, the promise of the cross, the promise of Easter, the promise in God's courtroom: "I forgive you; you're right by me."

What are some ways (family trees, world history, church history) that God worked his story into your story, or that God worked your story into his story?

Now the promise gets bigger and better. "Those he predestined, he also called; those he called, he also justified; those he justified, he also glorified." That last part - "those he justified, he also glorified" - that's hard to see, isn't it? I've looked in the mirror; I don't look glorified. I don't feel glorified. But Paul says you and I - we are glorified. So how do we explain what Paul is saying. One way is this: Paul is talking about the future - "we will be glorified" - with a past tense verb - "we have been glorified" - to show our future glory is as good as done. Another way to look at it is this way: already God is calling you his children and his saints; already God is giving you his Spirit, his deposit and guarantee of heaven; already God is giving you his name and his glory. Another way to look at it is this: We go back to Romans 6, two chapters before our lesson. Paul is talking baptism. In your baptism, you are connected to Jesus, so closely connected to Jesus that his death counts as your death; in baptism, you are so closely connected to Jesus that his life means life for you; in baptism, you are so closely connected with Jesus, that when Jesus crossed the finish line into the glory of heaven - it is just as if you crossed the finish line - his victory is your victory, his glory is your glory.

Bottom line - our future is set, your future is set with Jesus. And now we get to see how God will work it so that all things work together for our good. We already know some of those stories of grace and glory. We don't have to wait until heaven to tell those stories or celebrate those stories. Already today, we get to celebrate - those God fore-knew, he also called; those he has called, he also justified; those he has justified, he also glorified! We have it made - God is working all things together for our good! Amen.

How does Satan work to turn God's wonderful teaching of foreknowledge, election, and predestination into a stew of doubt, confusion, and questions?

What is the simple answer for those doubts and questions?

FIRST LESSON Romans 8:18-25, 28-30

I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us. The creation waits in eager expectation for the sons of God to be revealed. For the creation was subjected to frustration, not by its own choice, but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the glorious freedom of the children of God.

Not only so, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for our adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies. For in this hope we were saved. And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose. For those God foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the likeness of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brothers. And those he predestined, he also called; those he called, he also justified; those he justified, he also glorified.




