Sermon followed by Service

November 28, 2021

Luke 19:28-40

The President doesn't fly coach; he doesn't drive a Pontiac G6. When the President travels, he rides in style; he rides to impress. When the President travels, it's show-time. If that's true today, it was even more true at the time of our lesson. When a king would come to town, if the king wanted to be seen as king, feared as king, obeyed as king, he would have to show it. So when a king came to town, it was show-time - time for the king to show his power, his glory and greatness - time for the king to awe and wow his people. And his people? If they wanted the king to see them and treat them as friend, and not as enemy, when a king would come to town, the people would come out to meet their king, cheer their king, pave the way for their king. When a king came to town, it was show-time.

And so, in our lesson, what do we see? It was show-time for Jesus - time for Jesus to show himself as King. So Jesus doesn't just walk into town, he rides as King. And his people? They don't just walk with Jesus; they put on a show. They pave the way ahead of Jesus with palm branches and cloaks, their jackets. They cheer and announce their King's arrival; they fill the air with shouts of glory - "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!" "Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!" And so we see Jesus, our Christ, our King, coming onto the scene, riding in glory.

But what does a closer look show us? It doesn't take much of a closer look to see that our King's ride is no glorious steed, no glorious war-horse; he's riding a donkey. And his royal retinue? No professional, armed, trained bodyguards; no soldiers marching, weapons banging; no trumpets blaring; no "friends of the king" at his side, power-brokers with money and power to do the king's bidding.

No. As Jesus rides, as this king comes onto the scene - he shows little to instill fear or stand-back-awe. His glory is more humble than glorious. His power more hidden than shown. As Jesus comes onto the scene, whether at Christmas, or riding into Jerusalem, or even today - as Jesus comes onto the scene he shows little to instill fear or awe.

Why? Jesus didn't come to instill fear or untouchable awe as Lord and King; Jesus came to bring comfort and peace. Jesus didn't come to gain a following for

himself, to feed his ego, to protect and project his ego. No, Jesus came to show his Father's heart, to project his Father's heart, to gain a following for his Father's heart. Jesus didn't come to rule some piece of this world; Jesus came to show and tell and invite the world into the blessings of heaven - grace, mercy, and peace.

And so when Jesus comes onto the scene, Jesus doesn't ride to impress with glory; he doesn't look to project fear and untouchable awe; he doesn't present himself us untouchable and unapproachable. He rides in humility, and presents himself as touchable, approachable, even hold-able.

We like that, don't we? Oh, sometimes we're like the disciples wishing Jesus would act more like a King here in this world, that he would show more glory, project more power and might, that he would set up his kingdom with us here and now. Sometimes we might wish Jesus would act more like a King here, that he would project more of his power and might - with more judgment, quicker judgment; that he would put his enemies and our enemies in their places right here, right now. That day is coming, but first we see Christmas and celebrate Christmas and celebrate Jesus as that little baby in the manger, the little baby in Mary's arms - touchable, hold-able. And not just touchable, hold-able for Mary and Joseph, but touchable, hold-able, for you and for me in the Lord's Supper. When Jesus comes onto the scene, he could come riding on the clouds with all the glory and judgment of heaven. And some day, he will! But first - isn't it neat that first he presents himself as approachable, touchable, hold-able - with grace and mercy and peace?

Which picture of Jesus do you prefer - Jesus as Judge? Or the Christmas Day Jesus?

What might happen if we were to focus exclusively on one or the other? Is it alright to hope and pray that Jesus returns soon as Lord + Judge? Has there ever been a time you weren't ready for his return? Do you know anyone who isn't ready?

And isn't it so terribly sad when we take advantage of his grace, mercy, and peace, when we abuse the way he presents himself as approachable, touchable, hold-able. We see it throughout history. In the garden of Eden, God presents himself as approachable - he walks and talks with Adam and Eve. But then Adam and Eve somehow think that listening to Satan's tempting is better than listening to God, that Satan is more trustworthy than God, that they can do better for themselves by disobeying God instead of walking with God. And when Jesus comes on the scene at Christmas, what does Herod the great do? When he hears that God's King is born, Herod doesn't join the wise men in worshiping Jesus. No, Herod sees Jesus as two-bit competition to clear out. And now, in our lesson, what about Jesus' enemies? How did Jesus' enemies see Jesus? Not as glorious and holy - don't mess with him. No, they see Jesus as someone small they could boss around, someone small they could trip and trap, someone small they could slap around, someone they could get rid of with a Roman cross.

That was then. What about now? What about us? How often don't we use Jesus' humility - Jesus showing himself as approachable, touchable, hold-able how often don't we use Jesus' humility as an excuse for our treating him poorly. Maybe we don't think of it that way. But somehow people - I'm not talking about people out there; I'm talking about people in Christ's church, people who call themselves Christians - somehow there are Christians who think that when Jesus calls and invites, it's alright not to answer, that it's alright to be too busy for Jesus. Somehow there are Christians who think that Jesus should be happy with their leftovers, that it's ok to be cheap with Jesus. Somehow there are Christians who think that it's ok to pick and choose from what Jesus says, and that Jesus should be happy that we think of him at all. Somehow there are Christians who think it's alright to disrespect Jesus. Do you know any Christians like that? I've been that Christian. How about you? Why? Why do we think it ok to disrespect Jesus? How can we be so willing to settle, so willing to take the easy way out in our walk with Jesus? Is it because Jesus presents himself as approachable, touchable, holdable? Is it because Jesus presents himself with grace, mercy, and peace?

Which trap are we more likely to fall into seeing Jesus too fearfully and awe-fully? Or seeing Jesus too casually?

And yet that's what he does. Jesus could present himself with all the glory of God; he could shock and awe; he could fill us with fear as unapproachable and untouchable. Instead, he comes to us as that tender baby born in Bethlehem - touchable, hold-able. He comes to us in his Word - with grace and truth - calling, inviting: "Come to me, follow me." He comes to us in his Supper - "my body for you; my blood for you." Yes, Jesus comes to us approachable, touchable, hold-able. He comes to us with peace from heaven, with forgiveness won at the cross; he comes to us with life and love from God.

So how will we greet him? In fear, standing back, far back? Casually, with hardly a thought, with hardly a budge of our heart? Wouldn't it be great to be part of that crowd we have in our lesson? Cheering Jesus! Paving the way for Jesus! Letting the world know what Jesus means to us! Letting the world know what Jesus can mean for them!

This season of Advent is the church's reminder, the church's nudge - it's time! It's time to be part of the crowd preparing the way for Jesus. It's time to be part of the crowd cheering Jesus. It's time to be part of the crowd letting the world know - Jesus is on his way! Jesus is on his way with life and love from God! Amen.

How are you part of the crowd preparing the way for Jesus? How are you letting the world know - Jesus is on his way!
