Sermon followed by Service

November 6, 2022

1 Corinthians 15:51-57

Picture with me, imagine with me - the finish line, your finish line. When you picture your finish line, what picture come to mind? Maybe you picture the last of your leaves raked up. Or making it to the highest level of video game nirvana. Or maybe for your finish line, you think of making it, graduating from high school or college, moving out on your own, getting the job you went to school for, finding the love of your life - maybe that's your idea of the finish line. Or maybe for your finish line, you dream of making it to retirement, getting the house fixed up, paid off. Or maybe your finish line is getting out of the house, a cabin up north in the summer, a place down south in the winter. Or maybe when you picture your finish line, this is what comes to mind - falling asleep on the couch or your favorite comfy chair at the end of the day. If - when I said: "picture your finish line" - if any of that came to mind, I hope it was only for a moment, only for the blink of an eye.

Why? When I said: "Picture your finish line," this is what I hope came to your mind: a picture of Jesus and the Father, arms open, with a smile beaming full of love. You hear them: "Welcome home! Well done, good and faithful servant." You see all around you the light and the life of heaven. And then when it's time for the big finish line reception, you see the saints in heaven, not just Peter and Paul, Mary and Martha; you see Bill and JoAnn, Helmut, Doris, and Juanita. You see the hands that showed you how to fold your hands. You hear the voices that taught you: "Come, Lord Jesus." "Now I lay me down to sleep." "Our Father who art in heaven." You see the smiles; you hear the thanks from those you taught to pray, those you brought to church, those you brought to Jesus.

And somehow your arthritis and sciatica are gone. Your joints don't hurt anymore. Your eyes don't squint any more. Your ears, they actually hear what people say the first time they say it. You feel the best you've ever felt - ever. On the other side of the finish line, your body is made new. It's still your body, not a trade-in and trade-up model. It's your body made perfect. Instead of perishable, aging, breaking down, falling apart, expiring, it's imperishable, never aging, never breaking down, never falling apart. Never expiring. Instead of mortal, susceptible to death, on the other side of the finish line, you and your body will be immortal. Not just a physical body, bound by the rules of physics and biology, but a spiritual body, free like Jesus with his body. In your new body, you will be together with God and the angels, celebrating life and love together with God and his people - forever. That's what's at the finish line.

What's between here and the finish line? Disease and worse - dis-ease - dismay, distress, disgust, disappointment. Dismay, distress, disgust, disappointment when we see what the world is doing around us. Dismay, distress, disgust, disappointment when we see people close to us get close and tight with the world following the ways of the world. And dismay, distress, disgust, disappointment when we see how we can be so like the world.

That's right. What else is between here and the finish line? Distraction. The ways of the world distracting us. The good life distracting us. Our aches and pains, our hurt and heartaches distracting us.

((Which is more dangerous for you - the dis-ease of this life? Or the distractions of this life? Which are getting between you and the finish line?))

What's between here and the finish line? Death. In our lesson, Paul describes death, not as an event, not as a state of being, but as an enemy. We've all had a taste of what death can do. We've felt death in our bodies. And we've felt death in our hearts. And it hurts. It hurts so that we feel dismay, distress, distraught, disturbed in our hearts. Death hurts, and so we look for ways to avoid death, delay death, deny death, distract ourselves from death. Paul gives us a better answer for death than distract, delay, and deny. At the finish line, we will see - "death has been swallowed up in victory."

I should be more clear. With Jesus. At the finish line with Jesus, we will see "death has been swallowed up in victory." If I cross the finish line without Jesus, maybe just pretending to have Jesus, then what I hear from Jesus won't be "Welcome Home!" What I will hear from Jesus is "depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels." But with Jesus, when we cross the finish line, we will see "death has been swallowed up in victory!" And we will join God's judging cheer: "Where, o death, is your victory? Where, o death, is your sting?"

Why? You've heard Paul say: "The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." Here Paul uses a different picture: "The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." I read that and part of me says: "What's Paul saying?" Another part of me answers: "Jesus gives us the victory." That's true, but what about that first line: "The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law"? What does that mean? I usually think of the sting of death as the pain of dying, more broadly, as the sting (the hurt and heartache) of living in a world of death, or I think of the sting of death as hell. But Paul sees the sting

of death as sin. Dying is a result, hell is a result - the cause is sin. Death gets its victims by sin. Take away sin, and what happens to death? No sting.

And when Paul talks about the "power of sin," I usually think of sin's tantalizing power, sin's power to lure me in, to suck me in to its lie. But Paul is talking about the "power of sin" in a different way. He says: "The power of sin is the law" because Paul is thinking about how the law condemns sin and damns the perpetrator of sin. Take away the law that condemns, and what harm can sin and death then do?

And that is what Jesus did! In your place, in my place, in place of all humanity, Jesus took God's law - the law that would condemn us - and he kept it and he obeyed it perfectly. He obeyed every command; he satisfied every demand. In life and death, he satisfied God's law perfectly - "It is finished." At the same time, Jesus took our sin - your sin, my sin, the sin of the whole, wide world - and as the Lamb of God he paid the price so that - with Jesus - God sees your sin gone and you forgiven. In other words, God sees the law that would condemn us as satisfied; he sees the sin that would damn us taken away. In Jesus, the power of sin is neutralized and done; the sting of death is neutralized and gone. And with Paul we give thanks: "Thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

Now what? We get to see death swallowed up in Christ's victory. We get to see the finish line with our perishable bodies, crumbling and rotting, made imperishable, never to age or decay. We get to see the finish line with our mortal bodies made immortal, never to die. We get to see the finish line and what we will be like at the finish line - all of our aging swallowed up, all of our breaking up and

breaking down swallowed up, all of our dying swallowed up. We get to see ourselves alive and victorious with Jesus, alive and victorious like Jesus.

Not just at the finish line. That's the way we get to see ourselves today. Yes, that's the way you get to see yourself today alive and victorious with Jesus, alive and victorious like Jesus. We don't have to live like death is the end and that's all we have to look forward to. We don't have to live defeated, dismayed, distraught, disappointed. We don't have to live distracted looking for some better life. We get to live focused, delighted, and determined. Focused, delighted and determined to live the best life. Focused, delighted, and determined to live the Jesus life. Focused, delighted, and determined to live alive and victorious with Jesus. As Paul says: "Thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my dear brothers, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain." And so we see our finish line, and we live focused, delighted, and determined - with Jesus, Amen.

Hebrews 11:8-10, 13-16, 32-40

By faith Abraham, when called to go to a place he would later receive as his inheritance, obeyed and went, even though he did not know where he was going. By faith he made his home in the promised land like a stranger in a foreign country; he lived in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God.

All these people were still living by faith when they died. They did not receive the things promised; they only saw them and welcomed them from a distance, admitting that they were foreigners and strangers on earth. People who say such things show that they are looking for a country of their own. If they had been thinking of the country they had left, they would have had opportunity to return. Instead, they were longing for a better country—a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared a city for them.

And what more shall I say? I do not have time to tell about Gideon, Barak, Samson and Jephthah, about David and Samuel and the prophets, who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, and gained what was promised; who shut the mouths of lions, quenched the fury of the flames, and escaped the edge of the sword; whose weakness was turned to strength; and who became powerful in battle and routed foreign armies. Women received back their dead, raised to life again. There were others who were tortured, refusing to be released so that they might gain an even better resurrection. Some faced jeers and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were put to death by stoning; they were sawed in two; they were killed by the sword. They went about in sheepskins and goatskins, destitute, persecuted and mistreated — the world was not worthy of them. They wandered in deserts and mountains, living in caves and in holes in the ground.

These were all commended for their faith, yet none of them received what had been promised, since God had planned something better for us so that only together with us would they be made perfect.

In October, Baroque Plus, a Ukrainian musical group that includes members of the Ukrainian Lutheran Church (ULC), traveled to Germany to present concerts at several Evangelical Lutheran Free Church (ELFK) congregations. These concerts were a thank you for the German church's support to Ukrainian refugees who fled the country to escape the war with Russia. These concerts not only showed the ULC's gratitude for that aid but also offered an opportunity to assimilate the refugees more fully into the German Lutheran churches.

Three sister church bodies—the Ukrainian Lutheran Church, the Evangelical Lutheran Free Church in Germany, and WELS—worked together to plan the trip. Three ELFK congregations hosted the special worship services that included music from Baroque Plus, other German and Ukrainian hymns, gospel readings, devotions, and prayer.

"The services were edifying and beautiful," says Rev. Roger Neumann, WELS' liaison to the Ukrainian Lutheran Church. "Translators made it possible that three languages were used during the service: Ukrainian, German, and English. Although, for the Lord's Prayer, all three languages were spoken at the same time, which was quite impressive."

Fellowship times before, during, and after the services provided opportunities for members from the Ukrainian Church and German church to interact. "There was truly a unique bond of fellowship at each church, which flowed from a sense of empathy, Christian love and concern, and the powerful bond of unity that believers have in Christ. Strangers quickly became friends," says Neumann. "We pray that those who attended the service, Ukrainian and German visitors who have no church home, will come again to learn more about Jesus and what he has done for them and for all people."

Hanna Bulu, the leader of Baroque Plus and a member at Resurrection, Kiev, Ukraine, appreciated the opportunity to come to Germany. "After traveling thousands of kilometers from our native home, we met good friends in Germany—and also a long-forgotten feeling of peace and quiet. Such concerts are like bridges between churches, between hearts, between children of God, who are one in Christ."

WELS, the ULC, and the ELFK are all part of the **Confessional Evangelical Lutheran Conference** (CELC), a group of 34 Lutheran church bodies from around the world committed to the teachings of the Lutheran Church found in the *Book of Concord*. This fellowship of believers offers support in faith and doctrine. "This was a blessing, given to us by our Lord, that flows from the unity of believers from around the world who form the CELC," says Neumann. "The people from Ukraine who were there that week, as well as people from the various church bodies that form the CELC, can better understand that they are never alone." Feedback encouraged on doctrinal statement

Biblical doctrines and principles do not change. But there are times when those doctrines and principles need to be understood clearly as new situations arise and are addressed by the church. That is certainly true when it comes to what the Bible tells us about the God-given roles of men and women and the nature of their relationship with one another.

Our synod's current doctrinal statement on the roles of men and women is called "Scriptural Principles of Man and Woman Roles." After more than a decade of work and discussion, it was adopted by the 1993 synod convention as a correct explanation of biblical truth and as our synod's formal doctrinal statement on the issue.

Since the adoption of "Scriptural Principles of Man and Woman Roles," our synod's doctrinal position has not changed; the statement still expresses biblical truth. But new questions and issues have arisen regarding the biblical roles of men and women that did not really exist in 1993. Understandably, those questions were not addressed at the time.

For those reasons, the Conference of Presidents determined that it would be beneficial for our synod to consider an updated restatement of the scriptural principles outlined in the 1993 document. After three years of work and study, a proposed draft of that statement is now ready. The new statement is entitled "God's beautiful and balanced design for male and female." The Conference of Presidents encourages you to study and discuss the statement and invites you to provide feedback.
