SERMON FOLLOWED BY SERVICE

Advent 1 - 2021 - De-Stress from Calendar Distress

Mt 11:28 and Ps 46:10

What's the first thing that comes to mind? You're late. You need to be getting out of the house, but you can't find your wallet or the grocery list. Instead, what you find is your "to-do" list - your "to-do list for the week, your "to-do" list for the weekend. It seems that nothing is getting marked off. Instead, the lists of things you have to do and people you have to see, those lists are just getting longer and longer. But you don't have time to think about that. You're late; you need to get going; but you can't find anything you're looking for. That's when your favorite someone comes in and asks: "Did you look where you put it last?" You look a look that you shouldn't be looking. And your favorite someone says: "Relax."

What's the first thing that comes to mind? Is it reaching in and ripping out the tongue of your favorite someone? Or is it: "Relax?! I can't relax! I have to!"

"I have to" Sometimes - especially in December - we can get stuck on "I have to." Even if somebody offers to help, even if somebody offers a way out, we can get so stuck on those words "I have to." "I have to - because it's my job." "I have to - because I'm the only one who can do it right."

Or is it - "I have to - because I'm the only one who can do it my way"?

"I have to - because I can't say 'no." "I have to - because I have to make up for the way I looked and growled at you." "I have to - so I don't make them angry." "I have to - so that they love me." "I have to - so I can feel special and important." *(Even if it means feeling like a special and important victim, doormat?)* "I have to." "I have to" isn't always a good reason, is it?

Sometimes "I have to" is a lie. What "I have to" lies are you hearing from yourself? How will you silence those lies? What Truth will you speak over those lies? Whom do you have to help you?

Sometimes our December distress isn't "I have to," but "you have to." Your boss, your teacher, your mom, your dad, your husband, your wife, the in-laws, your guilty conscience - in December it can be like they all gang up behind your back, and one-at-a-time and all-together, they let loose: "You have to." Or it may be your family, friends, neighbors; they don't say a word, but you see what they're doing - shopping, crafting, lighting up the neighborhood, hosting in, partying out; and a voice from deep inside you commands: "You have to. You have to do the same."

What might be some reasons they have so much more time and money for their holiday stuff? What will happen to all their holiday stuff? What will come of your Holy Day life?

"You have to." Sometimes, maybe we do have to, because it's the right thing to do. And sometimes we don't have to, because it's the wrong thing to do. And sometimes, it's in between. Somebody's "you have to" may be a fine thing, even a good thing to do, but it doesn't fit you or your life. It doesn't fit the time you have; it doesn't fit the energy you have; it doesn't fit what you want to do. It can be alright to say "No, no thank you, not now, another time." Just because someone says: "You have to" doesn't mean that you always have to, does it?

And then there's God - God telling us, calling us, inviting us. Did you notice a problem there? I put God down the list after me telling me what to do, and the world telling me what to do. Putting God down the list is a double-trouble problem. First, in whose mind is it a good idea to put God off? Did I hear you say: "Satan"?

Does that mean that we have to do every God-thing that God presents to us? (Consider Mary and Martha)

Second, putting God off down the list is double-trouble because when we put God off down the list, we're not in a good place to hear what Jesus has to say. What Jesus loves to say isn't "you have to do more, do more, do more." No, what Jesus loves to say is: "Come to me ... and I will give you rest." What Jesus loves to say is: "Repent, relax; I've got this, and I've got you."

What are some of the different ways God says: "Repent and relax. I've got this, and I've got you"?

That fits so well with Advent lessons we'll hear this month. From Isaiah - "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government and peace there will be no end. He will reign on David's throne and over his kingdom, establishing and upholding it with justice and righteousness from that time on and forever. The zeal of the LORD Almighty will accomplish this." Don't you love to hear that? It's not up to us to make things right; it's not up to us to keep things right. Jesus will make things right; Jesus will keep things right.

What does it mean that Jesus works to make/keep things right for you,

and that Jesus works to make/keep things right through you?

How do those truths work together? How do you balance those two truths?

And Micah - "But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel "He will stand and shepherd his flock in the strength of the LORD ... and he will be their peace." In a world of people bossing and bullying, in a world demanding your time, Jesus steps in as Ruler and Shepherd - and he will be our peace.

And then with a smile, maybe with a deep breath and a sigh, we sing "Silent Night! Holy Night! All is calm" Not just calm for "the virgin mother and child," but peace and calm for us, even if just for a moment. Why? How?

What Advent/Christmas songs help you to de-stress with Jesus?

How does Jesus give peace and rest? He doesn't just say: "Relax." He doesn't just say: "Peace." He doesn't just say: "Don't do more than you can handle." No, Jesus doesn't just "say." Instead, Jesus did and Jesus does. From heaven, Jesus stepped in for us, God for us. Think what that gets to mean - You know how exhausting, how frustrating it is to have voices always demanding more, demanding better, voices in you and around you that are never satisfied. And you know the blow-back, how people make you pay when you don't do what they want the way they want. With Jesus, you can know that God's voice isn't among those voices. With Jesus, there is no blow-back, no making-you-pay. As far as God is concerned, Jesus stepped in and took the blow-back, paid the price for you - that's what the cross is about. As far as God is concerned, Jesus stepped in and loved God first and best; he loved your neighbor as himself; he knew when to jump in and help; he knew when to step back to rest and to pray; he made time and cared for the crowds; he made time and cared for that one hurting heart in the crowd, that hurting heart no one else had time for. Jesus stepped in and he lived that life for you. Now, as far as God is concerned, all God's demands for a right life, all God's expectations for you are met in Jesus, his life for you.

I said: "As far as God is concerned." We still hear other voices demanding. We still feel blowback when we don't do enough, right enough. But with Jesus, the God who created you and put you here in this world, in this time and place - he says: "Repent and relax. With Jesus, you're right by me." With Jesus, the God who provides jobs and paychecks, food and drink, house and home - with Jesus, your Father in heaven says: "Repent and relax. With Jesus, I've got this, and I've got you." With Jesus, the God who holds back Satan, the God who makes all things work for our good - he says: "Repent and

relax; I've got this, and I've got you." With Jesus, the Judge who is Lord of Life and Death, who Judge who holds the key to heaven - he says: "Repent and relax. Look around - none of their grouchy growling, none of your grouchy growling, none of their frenzied frenzy, none of your frenzied frenzy - none of that matters. With what I have coming for you, none that matters. So repent and relax - I've got you right with me, forever."

Thoughts that didn't make the cut:

1. Frenzied and frantic - does that sound like your December? What makes it worse is this - this is supposed to be a time of peace! So not only do I let myself get frazzled, frenzied, and frantic, but I feel guilty for feeling frazzled, frenzied, and frantic. And sometimes, it doesn't take much to turn frazzled, frenzied, frantic, and *guilty* into frazzled, frenzied, frantic and *angry*. And if you say "relax," chances are I'll go through feeling frenzied, guilty, stupid before I get to relaxed.

What helpful hints do you have for your family and friends so that you can help each other through those times?

2. We don't have to do everything ...
