Sermon followed by Service

December 12, 2021

Luke 3:7-18

I invite you to close your eyes. Imagine the sweet and soothing sounds of Advent. "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." "Nachimu, nachimu, ami." "Comfort, comfort, my people ... speak of peace," says our God. Imagine Mary's sweet soprano: "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior." And Zechariah's rich baritone: "Praise be to the Lord, the God of Israel, because he has come and has redeemed his people." Add Simeon: "Lord, you let your servant depart in peace!" Now imagine God's prophet, John, named for God's grace: "You brood of vipers. Who warned you to flee the coming wrath?"

What are your favorite sweet and soothing sounds of Advent and Christmas?

When you hear that Advent voice, what's your first thought? "Who does he think he is?" "Who's he talking to?" "Why should I have to listen to talk that like?"

What was your first thought when you heard John pointing: "You brood of vipers"?

"Who does he think he is?" He's God's prophet John. Miracle baby of Zechariah and Elizabeth. He's God's promised prophet preparing the way for the Lord. "Who's he talking to?" He's talking to people who think they are just fine just the way they are, people content in their sin, because "what I do isn't as bad as what they do." He's talking to people who wear their religion on their sleeve, but it doesn't go any deeper than that. He's talking to people who want to hear nice things from God; they want a God connection, as long as it doesn't cost too much. And "why should I have to listen to talk like that" from John? Because that's not just John talking; that's God's Spirit talking, God's Spirit calling me out!

When I hear John call me out: "**You brood of vipers**" ... when you hear John, what's the first thing that goes on inside us? The shields go up. "Who does he think he is?" "Who's he talking to?" "Why should I have to listen to talk that like?" Our shields go up. That's kind of a cop-out, isn't it? Let's say it the way it is. Our shields don't go up on their own; we put our shields up. We deny. We blame. We excuse.

"Our shields go up" or "We put our shields up." Which seems more true for the people around you? Which seems more true for you? What is the solution when our shields go up before we consciously think?

John knew that. He had heard it all before. "We have Abraham as our father ... and that makes me right." We don't pull out the "Abraham shield," but that doesn't mean we don't have our shields, does it? When John calls us out ... when John calls on us to step up and prove our heart is with God, what shields go up around our hearts, around your heart? They come in every shape, size and color, don't they? "I've already done my part." "I'd do more, but the pastor or the politics or or or." "I'm too busy; I don't have time; I have too much going on." "All the church wants is my money." "I believe, but I'm not much for showing it; but I believe and that's all that matters, isn't it?" Or, or, or. Our shields come in all shapes and sizes, but they all say pretty much the same thing - "Don't expect me to change. At least not any time soon. I'm fine the way I am."

What shields do you hear from others? ... from yourself?

That's why God sent John. That's why I need John. That's why you need John. To call us out of our contentment with the way we are. Jesus is coming. I didn't say "Christmas is coming." I said, "Jesus is coming." And he's not carrying a big, red bag of toys slung over his shoulder to make everybody happy. He's carrying an ax, an ax to cut down and burn the dead waste of humanity that fills this world.

"So what should we do?" That's what they asked John: "What should we do then?" Did you notice that John didn't say: "Just believe and you'll be fine." No, John said: "Do!" John said: "Repent! Change! If you don't want to be cut down and burned up like the dead waste of humanity around you, it's time to show you're different. Fitting in with the world will show you're fit for the fire. Show your faith. Show your love. Show that you have the heart of God."

How? You heard what John told the people in the crowd. He didn't call on them to change the world. He called on them to be different and to show the heart of God in their living and their giving. What might he say to us? If we're students he might say: "Don't cheat. Use the gifts God gave you. Learn how to do something useful with your life." If we're sales people he might say: "Don't halftruth your way to make your deal. Help people get the deal they need." If we work in an office, what might he say? "Get off Facebook and do your job." Or maybe "stop the gossip and pick someone up, encourage someone with Jesus." Or if we're retired? "Stop thinking you're on your time; as long as you're alive you're still on God's time. Let's do something worthwhile with the time God gives us."

Why don't we hear John, Peter, Paul, Mary, Jesus, et al calling on us to change the world?

What might John say to us?

When do I get to be done asking: "What should I do then?"

Are you wondering what happened to "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" ... "Comfort, comfort, ye my people"? Are you ready for some of those sweet sounds of Advent? So were the people at the time of John. They had heard the promise of a Champion to crush the devil's head, but evil was all around them. They had heard the promise of a Prophet greater than Moses to bring them God's Truth, but year after year, no prophet - it was as if God had turned his back on them. They had heard the promise that the Kingdom of David would reign forever, but for centuries foreigners ruled them, squeezed them, crushed them. They still had a temple, one of the most glorious temples in all the world, but most everything that went on in and around it was corrupt; for so many, their religion left them feeling guilty and dirty. But they still heard the promise of a Messiah who would stand up for them and make life right. So now they were waiting. Now they were hoping. And now they were thinking that John might be that Messiah.

For these people, John's message was more than "do or doom." John had good news! God was stepping into the history of his people! The promised Messiah was coming to deliver his people! For a hurting and broken people, for a hopeful and faithful people, John promised a new life with God. As he baptized crowds of people into this new life, he promised them the forgiveness of their sin. And as he baptized and promised the forgiveness of sin, he called God's people to live new lives, changed lives, to live and give with the heart of God.

Now we still hear the voice of John. At times it is sharp, calling us out of our self-satisfaction. At times, John's voice is hard - "**The ax is ready** ... **Jesus is coming with winnowing fork in his hand.**" We need to know - Jesus means business. And when we put our shields and our excuses down, and know that Jesus

means business, we get to hear the voice of John point to Jesus sweet with words of promise - "Look, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world." Your sin has been paid for. Yes, Jesus is coming with life and love for you! Amen.

We usually don't think of John as a "Good News" preacher; we usually think of John as more "fire and brimstone." Where do you hear "Good News" in the accounts of John the Baptist?

SERIES THEME

THE LORD COMES NEAR

"Advent" comes from a Latin word that means "coming." The season of Advent is the four week period before Christmas that the Church uses to connect the two "comings" of Christ. The first time the Lord came into our world it was as a tiny, helpless baby, born in a manger in Bethlehem. However, when Jesus comes again, it will be in all his power and glory with his angelic army behind him. He will be coming as judge at the end of time. Let us use these four weeks to see how the events of Jesus' first coming remove all our fears about his second coming. We can hold our heads high when the Lord comes near.

THEME OF THE DAY

WHEN THE LORD COMES NEAR, HE HUMBLES HIS ENEMIES

Last week we saw that the Lord sends messengers to call us to repentance. This week we learn that those who refuse to heed that call to humble themselves will be humbled anyway. The Lord who once came near in flesh and now comes near in Word and sacrament will one day come near with consuming fire and judgement. The Lord will humble his enemies. This truth does two important things. First, it adds urgency to God's Advent call to repentance. Second, it gives us comfort when we, as God's people, experience opposition from the world. Those who oppress and harm God's people will face justice.

Luke 3:7-18

Who is Christ's enemy? Anyone who refuses the gifts of his grace, received humbly in repentant faith.

John said to the crowds coming out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Produce fruit in keeping with repentance. And do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' For I tell you that out of these stones God can raise up children for Abraham. The ax is already at the root of the trees, and every tree that does not produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire."

"What should we do then?" the crowd asked.

John answered, "The man with two tunics should share with him who has none, and the one who has food should do the same." Tax collectors also came to be baptized. "Teacher," they asked, "what should we do?"

"Don't collect any more than you are required to," he told them.

Then some soldiers asked him, "And what should we do?"

He replied, "Don't extort money and don't accuse people falsely - be content with your pay."

The people were waiting expectantly and were all wondering in their hearts if John might possibly be the Christ. John answered them all, "I baptize you with water. But one more powerful than I will come, the thongs of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his barn, but he will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire." And with many other words John exhorted the people and preached the good news to them.
