
"Speak, O Savior; I Am Listening" Hymn 283




CONFESSION & ABSOLUTION OF SINS

GOSPEL LESSON Mark 9:2-9

After six days Jesus took Peter, James and John with him and led them up a high mountain, where they were all alone. There he was transfigured before them. His clothes became dazzling white, whiter than anyone in the world could bleach them. And there appeared before them Elijah and Moses, who were talking with Jesus.

Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters - one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah." (He did not know what to say, they were so frightened.)

Then a cloud appeared and enveloped them, and a voice came from the cloud: "This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!"

Suddenly, when they looked around, they no longer saw anyone with them except Jesus.

As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus gave them orders not to tell anyone what they had seen until the Son of Man had risen from the dead.


APOSTLES' CREED

SERMON Jeremiah 17:9

I fear today is the day I'm going to ruin Valentine's Day for you. It's the season of hearts, red hearts, white hearts, silver hearts, gold hearts, chocolate hearts, Cheerio hearts, and almost best of all - pizza hearts. And what is the lesson that I pick for today? Jeremiah - "The heart is deceitful above all things and beyond cure. Who can understand it?" Jeremiah must have been the Valentine's Day Scrooge. And what does that make me? I suppose I'm a Valentine's Day Scrooge too.

Let's hear Jeremiah again: "The heart is deceitful above all things and beyond cure. Who can understand it?" What do you think of that? I see some of you agreeing. And you who are agreeing, you don't all look like Valentine's Day Scrooges. But I can also imagine some of you might not be feeling what Jeremiah is saying.

What kind of people disagree with Jeremiah's assessment: "the heart is deceitful above all things and beyond cure"?

Why is that? I googled some heart stuff. And Oprah.com says I'm wrong. I googled, and Oprah.com says that Jeremiah is wrong. Can you believe that? Oprah.com told me: "Listen to your heart. Follow your heart. It won't lead you wrong." We live in an Oprah.com world, don't we? We want to listen to our hearts; we want to follow our hearts; we want to think that our hearts won't lead us wrong. So Nike says: "Just do it." McDonalds says: "You deserve a break today." Burger King: "Have it your way."

What are some other messages that encourage us to follow our hearts?

When someone senses a "red flag" about a person or a relationship, we often hear people say: "Listen to your heart." When people sense those "red flags," what do we want to encourage? Is there a better way to affirm someone's "inner caution" than to say "follow your heart"?

We want to follow our hearts. So more and more, how do we determine right from wrong? The feelings of our hearts - if it feels good and right inside it must be good and right. Do you see a problem there? Some days, what feels good and right is making someone else feel bad. Some days, what feels good to some people is punching a wall or a face. Some days what feels good and right is feeling bad. Some days, what feels good is being contrary, rebellious, against whatever anyone else thinks. And some days, what feels good is living a make-believe life with a make-believe identity. What does that mean for our world? We live in a world where gender isn't determined by biology, but by feelings; truth isn't determined by facts, but by feelings; right and wrong isn't determined by God, but by feelings.

All this is nothing new; it goes all the way back to Adam and Eve. Eve, instead of listening to God, listened to Satan and the new feelings in her heart and chose to trust her feelings instead of trusting God. Adam and Eve's first child, Cain, instead of listening to God, he listened to the feelings in his heart, the anger, the hatred in his heart, and killed his brother. David, instead of listening to God, listened to the lust in his heart and took Bathsheba and killed her husband Uriah.

And it's not just in the Bible where the heart goes bad, is it? It's not just in the Bible where the heart leads wrong. Divorce lawyers aren't so busy because the heart won't lead wrong. Our teens aren't so hurting because the heart won't lead wrong. Morning-after pills aren't in such high demand because the heart won't lead wrong. Our capital in Washington doesn't have a fence around it because the heart won't lead wrong. No, the more we insist the heart won't lead wrong, the more we live in a broken and hurting world. And worse, the more we insist the heart won't lead wrong, the farther we find ourselves from God, rejecting his plan and his grace and daring him to judge. Daring God to judge. That's never been a winning move, even if it feels good and right.

In what ways might we be especially susceptible to having our hearts led wrong?

Jeremiah says: "The heart is deceitful above all things and beyond cure. Who can understand it?" What does that have to do with Transfiguration Sunday? Just days before our lesson, Jesus was telling his disciples about the cross. Peter let his heart get the better of him. Jesus and the cross didn't make sense to him. It didn't feel right to him. So he argued. We've done the same thing, haven't we? One way or another, God does something or says something we don't like. It doesn't make sense to us. It doesn't feel right to us. So what do we do? Some days we might argue, telling God how wrong he is. Other days we might shut our ears to God and go off and do our own thing. Do you remember how Jesus answered Peter? "Get behind me, Satan. You do not have in mind the things of God but the things of man." Ouch.

But Jesus didn't leave it there. Today in our lesson, Jesus takes Peter, along with James and John, along with him up a mountain. And there we see - with Peter, James, and John - Jesus isn't just some guy sharing his opinions, his feelings, his version of truth. Jesus is the Son of God with all the glory of God. Jesus is the Son of God with all the authority of God. So God the Father himself says: "Listen to him."

What lesson can we learn from Jesus in what he did for Peter after he cut Peter's arguing short? When you're on the front lines with someone arguing against God or questioning God, when it's your turn to speak, how might you do what Jesus did?

Listen to him when he says "do"; listen to him when he says "don't." Listen to him when he says "done." When he says "do" and "don't," he's not looking to make our hearts miserable; he's looking to give our hearts a safe place, a safe way to love and be loved. Like Eve, we don't always appreciate that. With the world, we might think there is a better way for us to love and be loved. But what does the world's way work? Hurt, heartache, guilt - not just the feeling of guilt, but the guilt that damns before God. When you're getting a taste of that hurt and heartache - as we all do - when you're getting a taste of that guilt - "listen to him." Look to the cross, and listen to Jesus say "done." "Done" is the guilt that would put you on the wrong side of God. "Done" is God's anger that would judge you and condemn you. That's right, with Jesus, "Done" is what needs to be done to be right with God. Why? Not because God feels it. No, because with his life and death Jesus has taken your place and satisfied God's law for you. And with his death on the cross, Jesus has taken our place and satisfied justice for you. So listen to Jesus say "done," and hear Jesus what Jesus has to say to you - with the approval of the Father - "We love you; we forgive you; we have you safe in our hearts - today and forever."

Is there a special "do," "don't," "done" that you need to hear at times? How do you set yourself up to hear the "do," "don't," "done" that you need?

"We love you; we forgive you; we have you safe in our hearts - today and forever." That sounds like heart talk, love talk, even feelings, doesn't it? Well, God isn't against hearts or love or even feelings. In fact, God is so much in favor of hearts and love and feelings of love and joy that he created us to have them. Not just once, but twice. Because we soiled and poisoned and twisted our first hearts, God has given us new hearts. That's right, God has given you a new heart; God lives in you with his heart so that you can love with God's love. He's given you a new heart; he lives in you with his heart so you can know his love and joy and peace.

Paul writes of this in Galatians 2:20 - "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me." What does this verse mean for you?

Having an old heart and a new heart can be confusing sometimes - am I feeling my old heart or my new heart? Am I hearing my old heart or my new heart? Am I following my old heart or my new heart? How can you know? Don't settle for a feeling. "Listen to him."

What voices in your life feed and echo your old heart? What voices in your life feed and echo your new heart?

I know, some days he'll call us up short. Some days he'll say things that don't sit well with our old heart. But that's ok, because some day he will call you up to heaven and welcome you home to a new life where you and your new heart will be perfectly at peace and perfectly at home. Sounds good, doesn't it? Amen.

Hear us, Lord, as we bring you our private petitions.


Silent prayer.
