Sermon followed by Service - Feb 23, 2025 - Luke 6:37-49

They call it "the fog of war." You're in a fight, a battle, a skirmish. It's night, so dark. You hear sounds. You're not sure where, you're not sure who, but your life is on the line, so you shoot. Then, in the dark, you see flashes, flashes that tell you someone else is shooting. You're not sure who's behind those flashes, but they feel like the enemy, so you shoot. It doesn't have to be dark. It could be the middle of the day - explosions, smoke, screams, people running everywhere. With the noise, the pounding, you don't know who is who or what's happening. Oh, you might think that you know, that you see clearly. But the wrong people get shot, friends get hurt, the enemy gets away, and truth becomes a casualty.

We all know something of the fog of war. We know it from our first days. We didn't feel right. We didn't know why. Maybe we were tired, maybe we just had gas. Something was wrong, nobody knew what, we didn't know why. But that didn't stop us - something was wrong. We screwed our eyes shut, balled up our fists, and kicking and screaming we went after anybody and everybody. Sometimes we still do the same. We're hurt. We're angry. We don't know why, but that doesn't stop us. It has to be something he did, she did. We get defensive; we get offensive. And what happens? The wrong people get shot at, friends get hurt, the enemy gets away, and truth becomes a casualty.

We're in a war, a war between good and evil, the war between God and evil. At the same time, we're in battle, in skirmishes, in conflict with people around us. In the fog of war we don't always see things clearly. When we feel attacked, we see people defensively - we blame and excuse. When we're not getting our way, we see people offensively - we judge and lash out. We get confused. Sometimes we don't know who the sides are, who's for us and who's against us. Sometimes we don't know what side we're on. In the battle between God and evil, we hear one thing at church, we hear the opposite all around us, and at other churches - who knows? So we might wonder: "Who's right and who's wrong?" And what happens in this fog of war? We get more confused. We take sides against people who should be our friends. We might even be on the wrong side and not even know it. And what happens? The wrong people get shot at, friends get hurt, the enemy gets away, and God's love and God's truth become casualties.

Jesus knows a thing or two about the fog of war. Jesus came into our world as Prince of Peace and he was judged to be enemy. He came as the Son of God and was judged to be in league with the devil. He came bringing life and love from God and he was judged worthy of hate and death. Jesus came to be our Champion in the fight against evil and we made him our victim. Yes, Jesus knows a thing or two about the fog of war. He knows how confused we can make ourselves about right and wrong. He knows how confused we can be in our conflicts. He knows how we take shots at the people round us. He knows how we take shots at him. And he knows what we deserve for what we have done to God's love and God's truth. But instead of judging us, condemning us, damning us which is what we deserve - Jesus came into our battle and he took up the fight for us. He didn't get confused about right and wrong, but he picked up his Bible and he put sin and Satan in their place. He didn't get confused or blinded by his hurt, but he prayed: "Father, not my will, but thy will be done." He prayed: "Father, forgive them." He prayed: "Father, into your hands I commit my Spirit." In all the fog and confusion of the war, Jesus didn't lose sight of what he came to do. Jesus stood in for us against sin and Satan. He stood in for us under the wrath and punishment of God. He stood in for us under the curse of death. And in all that, in all the hurt and anger and confusion, Jesus stood true with God; he stood true for you.

What does that get to mean for you today? For those times in the fog of war you were on the wrong side, those times you turned on the people God gave you to love, even for those times you turned against God for all those times, your debt to God is paid; God's charges against you are dropped. Jesus paid and now God forgives you. Instead of battling with God, instead of expecting God to strike back, we get to go home in peace with Jesus!

But what do we know? When we leave today, we aren't headed into a world of peace. When we leave today, we won't find everything right. We still live on a battlefield, the battlefield between God and evil. We're still surrounded by conflict and the fog of war. So what do we do? We listen to Jesus - remember, he knows a thing or two about conflict and the fog of war. What does Jesus say? In God's fight against evil, in your conflicts, if you fight blind, you're in a world of trouble. You're going to fall and you'll lead others into the pit with you. Jesus doesn't stop there. In your fight against evil, in your conflicts, if you think you know better than the Teacher, if you think you know better than Jesus, then you're listening to the wrong teacher.

In our fight against evil, in our conflicts, who is the first enemy we need to face? It is "I - Me, Myself, and I." Let's hear it from Jesus: "Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye? How can you say to your brother, 'Brother, let me take the speck out of your eye,' when you yourself fail to see the plank in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the plank out of your eye, and then you will see clearly to remove the speck from your brother's eye." In my hurt, in my pride, in my fear, in my fight, I'd like to think the problem starts with him, with her, with anyone but me. I might think that the only safe thing, the right and reasonable thing is to start against them and what they're doing. But there's a problem with that thinking: "I can't see clearly until I start with me." I need to start with my sin, my fears, my weakness, my guilt and wounded pride before I think I can go after someone else's faults.

And how do I deal with "Me, Myself, and I"? The answer isn't: "Follow the blind." And don't think you know better than the Teacher. If you think you know better than the Teacher, if you think you know better than Jesus, you'll come crashing down and fall into the pit of the godless. Here's how to clear the fog of war - listen to Jesus. In the battle, in the fog, listen to his promise for your hurts and fears: "I'm with you; I've got you safe." Listen to his promise for your guilt and insecurities: "I've got you covered; you're right by me." Listen to Jesus' promise for you: "I love you; I forgive you; I'm holding you safe and right for heaven."

And don't stop there. Listen to Jesus' heart for the people around you. In the fog of your battles, listen to the heart of Jesus: "Do not judge. Don't think it your place to get all high and mighty over people. Do not judge. Don't think the worst of people, what they say, the look on their face. Do not judge. Don't assume and condemn." Instead, listen to the heart of Jesus: "Forgive and give your heart. Forgive and give the benefit of the doubt. Forgive and give another chance. Forgive and give the heart of God."

In the fog of war and conflict, there can be so much we don't know - who is who? ... who's side are they on? ... why did they say this? ... why did they do that? In the fog of war and conflict, there is so much we don't know. But you do know this you know Jesus and you know his heart for you - "Peace!" Amen.

NEW MORNING PRAISE


"Blessed Jesus, at Your Word" Hymn 919


