FIRST LESSON

Jeremiah 24

After Jehoiachin son of Jehoiakim king of Judah and the officials, the craftsmen and the artisans of Judah were carried into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon by Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon, the LORD showed me two baskets of figs placed in front of the temple of the LORD. One basket had very good figs, like those that ripen early; the other basket had very poor figs, so bad they could not be eaten.

Then the LORD asked me, "What do you see, Jeremiah?"

"Figs," I answered. "The good ones are very good, but the poor ones are so bad they cannot be eaten."

Then the word of the LORD came to me: "This is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: 'Like these good figs, I regard as good the exiles from Judah, whom I sent away from this place to the land of the Babylonians. My eyes will watch over them for their good, and I will bring them back to this land. I will build them up and not tear them down; I will plant them and not uproot them. I will give them a heart to know me, that I am the LORD. They will be my people, and I will be their God, for they will return to me with all their heart.

"'But like the poor figs, which are so bad they cannot be eaten,' says the LORD, 'so will I deal with Zedekiah king of Judah, his officials and the survivors from Jerusalem, whether they remain in this land or live in Egypt. I will make them abhorrent and an offense to all the kingdoms of the earth, a reproach and a byword, an object of ridicule and cursing, wherever I banish them. I will send the sword, famine and plague against them until they are destroyed from the land I gave to them and their fathers.'"

GOSPEL LESSON

Mark 8: 31-38

He then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, chief priests and teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and after three days rise again. He spoke plainly about this, and Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him.

But when Jesus turned and looked at his disciples, he rebuked Peter. "Get behind me, Satan!" he said. "You do not have in mind the things of God, but the things of men."

Then he called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel will save it. What good is it for a man to gain the whole world, yet forfeit his soul? Or what can a man give in exchange for his soul? If anyone is ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of Man will be ashamed of him when he comes in his Father's glory with the holy angels."

NICENE CREED

Sermon-Based Bible Study - Jeremiah 24

February 7, 2021

There's an old Chinese story about a rice farmer who lived a very simple life. He had a small home and a few children, a small field of rice just enough to feed and provide for his family. Here's one version of the story -

One day a herd of wild horses come running through the village. They run into his rice field and get stuck in the mud and they can't get away. Now they're his! His neighbor comes running over: "This is good news! Such good fortune! You are rich, this is amazing!" And the rice farmer simply says: "Good news, bad news, who knows?"

A few weeks later his son, twelve years old, decides to take one of the wild horses for a ride. He jumps on and very shortly the wild horse throws him off, and the young son breaks his leg. The neighbor comes running over and says, "Oh no, this is such bad news!" And the farmer simply says, "Good news, bad news, who knows?"

A week later a Chinese general is marching through the farmer's village; he's marching with his army on the way to war. On the way, marching through the villages, they draft, they conscript, they take every boy over ten years old who is healthy - and off to war they go. In the farmer's village, all the healthy boys are taken - except the farmer's son because he has a broken leg. The neighbor comes running over and says, "Yes! This is wonderful news, how lucky are we!" And the father replies, "Good news, bad news, who knows?"

When you hear that story, what comes to mind for you?

The first time I read that story I thought: "Wow! I wish I had more of that wisdom, that patient perspective, that self-control." This last week reading the story again, I thought: "Oh. That's really sad." So which is it today? Maybe a bit of both. I wish I had more of the farmer's self-control, more of his patient

perspective in the face of bad news. At the same time though, that farmer's perspective is really sad. How so? More on that later.

First, I'd like to talk about this - what in our lesson made me think of this parable? It wasn't the figs. If Jeremiah saw the good figs as good and the bad figs as bad, I'll agree. What made me think of the parable was the people in the lesson and their lot in life. For example, if you were in Jerusalem and you were given the choice between, on the one hand, being chained up and forced to march some 900 miles, forced out of your home into exile in the homeland of the enemy, or, on the other hand, you could stay back home in Jerusalem, which would you choose? Free at home or forced march into exile? Most of us would choose to stay home, wouldn't we?

Which would you choose? What if God told you to surrender and go?

And if we were to see God at work, what would we see? We'd see God blessing those who got to stay home; we'd see God cursing, condemning those who were forced into exile, wouldn't we?

But the LORD said it was the opposite. Those forced out of their homes, forced into exile, they were the ones chosen by God to be blessed. And those who got to stay home, those who were able to escape, they were the ones condemned by God. Sounds so backwards, doesn't it?

So what was up? Good figs, bad figs. King Zedekiah of Jerusalem, his officials, and so many of the survivors of Jerusalem had shown themselves to be bad figs. They had shown that they weren't willing to listen to the LORD or to Jeremiah. They had shown they were going to do their thing, live their way, no matter what God said. So God saw them as bad figs. They would be left behind, as good as thrown out. If they stayed home, trouble and judgment would find them at home. If they tried to escape to Egypt, trouble and judgment would find them there. They had tested God's patience to the point that God was done with them. They had shown themselves to be done with God, and now God was done with them, just like any of us would be done with bad figs.

How do you reconcile God's loss of patience (and judgment) with his promise of grace and forgiveness?

And the good figs ... there were some in Jerusalem who had shown themselves to be good and godly. I'll drop some names - Ezekiel, Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. Who were they? Ezekiel was the priest and prophet who wrote the Bible book of Ezekiel. Daniel became a ruler in Babylonian empire; he survived a night in the lion's den; he wrote the Bible book of Daniel. Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego - they stood up to King Nebuchadnezzar; they wouldn't bow down to his idol; we know them as the three men in the fiery furnace. Yes, among those taken into exile were some good and godly people.

But the LORD doesn't say those taken into exile were taken because they were good figs. The LORD says they were taken into exile because he would make them good figs. He would work their time in exile to be good for them. He would watch over them and bring them back home, not just home to Jerusalem, but back home to him. He would plant in them a new life; he would grow in them a new heart. They would get to live a new life connected with the LORD - "I will be their God and they will be my people." God would take and make his people to be good and godly again, in the words of our lesson - good figs.

Taken into exile, or allowed to escape - which is good? Which is bad? Things aren't always the way they look, are they? I'm sure we can think of some good days that weren't as good for us as we thought. And I know you've had some very hard days that God has worked for your good. Good days, bad days - things aren't always the way they look. But that's no surprise to us, is it?

Do you have any examples you would like to share of good days that weren't as good as you thought or bad days that God worked for your good?

Why not? We remember a special holiday, a day when families would get together and celebrate - "We have a God who saves." But the celebrating that day was off; the sky turned dark and the earth quaked; people were left with an off feeling - "What's going on?" Why? That day the finest person in the history of the world was railroaded by a religious mob, tortured, and nailed to a cross. That day the holy Son of God himself was cursed by God. That day justice and rightness looked to be completely turned on their head. That day looked so

wrong, felt so wrong. But on that day, all the wrong of the world, your wrong, my wrong, all the wrong of the world was put on Jesus. All God's anger for all the wrong this world has ever done, for all the hurt this world has ever perpetrated, all God's anger, all God's judgment was taken out on Jesus. It didn't look right; it looked all wrong. Except in the courtroom of God, something beautiful happened. All the judgment we deserved was judged to be done - finished; all the evidence against you and me was thrown out; and instead of being counted guilty before God, God now judges you as right by him. Right for life with him, right to be blessed, right for heaven forever.

Imagine all the evidence against you were still waiting for your trial, and all the judgment you deserve were still ahead of you. What would that mean for the way you live today?

Imagine all the evidence against you thrown out, all the judgment you deserve "done." What does that mean for the way you live today?

Things aren't always the way they look, are they? An ugly, awful Friday can be a Good Friday. And an empty grave on Sunday If we were to go to the cemetery to have a little visit, and we found the grave we intended to visit empty, we wouldn't think that a good thing, would we? But the empty grave of Easter Sunday is so good and beautiful. Our Jesus lives! He keeps his promises! He works the impossible! Things aren't always the way they look, are they? With Jesus we get to know that God is always working a "Yes!" to his promises. With Jesus we get to know that God is always working for our good.

And that's what makes that Chinese story, the life of the Chinese farmer so sad. Good day, bad day, all he had was - "Who knows?" With Jesus, we know! With Jesus, we know the confidence of David - "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me, your rod and your staff, they comfort me." With Jesus, we know - "Surely goodness and mercy will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever! Yes, with Jesus and Jeremiah, we know the plans God has for us: "plans to give you peace and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future!" Yes, with Jesus, we know - a better day, a better life is coming! Amen.

On your dark days, how do you remind yourself of the hope you get to have in Jesus?
