I had it coming. I should have seen it coming. Last week I said this week would be easy. After the first week with the impossible First Commandment - "We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things" - I said last week would be easy with the Second and Third Commandments - "Do not misuse the name of the Lord your God" and "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." The Second and Third Commandments were supposed to be easy, but I fear I shamed God's name and unholied God's preaching.

How? On Monday, I started getting ready for today, studying the 4th, 5th, and 6th Commandments. Then on Tuesday, God started on me. He tested me; he tested us on the heart of those commandments - love for other people. And I fell short. Tuesday morning, after hours, days ... after weeks of phone-call run around, I lost my patience. After calming down, I told myself it was a good thing I was working from home, because whenever I preach on love for other people, somebody needing money help that I can't give, somebody needing Level Three help while we're still toying around with Level One help, drops in asking for the Pastor. Well, I needed to come in to the office, so you know what happened. Just when I'm getting something done, God tests me; God tests us with a someone looking for help. I don't want to be one of those loveless, useless people James talks about: full of talk - "I wish you well," but no useful action. I don't want to be one of those churches that looks good on the outside, but doesn't care about people from the other side of town. I said it would be an easy week; it didn't work out that

way. Then on Wednesday, I come in and somebody is parking in my parking spot, but not just that, he's parking in my back-up parking spot as well - he's straddling two spots, paying no attention to the fact that that's where I park. Thankfully, God gave me a closer parking spot before I failed yet another test. I should have seen it coming. I had it coming.

This commandment thing can be hard - especially if we go to the heart of the commandments. You know what Paul says: "The good that I would, I do not. The evil I don't want to do, I keep on doing." What comes next? It's not a shrug of the shoulders: "Oh, well." No, Paul doesn't just shrug over sin. Even before there was such a thing as the season of Lent, Paul lived with the heart of Lent: "What a wretch I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death?!" But Paul didn't sit around and wallow, either. Instead Paul brightened with Easter: "Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord! ... There is now no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus!" I failed; I fell short, but I don't need to wallow. I imagine I wasn't alone this past week. In how many different ways did you fall short of the life God has for you in the Ten Commandments? But we don't just shrug our shoulders, do we? - "oh, well." And we don't just stew in the pit of Lent: "what a wretch I am." With Jesus we get to move on to Easter - "there is now no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus." And now what? We don't just go on our way; we do what Paul does next. With the Holy Spirit inside us, we take up the struggle to live the life God has for us - a life showing and sharing God's goodness, a life showing and sharing God's heart with the people around us.

That's what the 4th, 5th, and 6th Commandments are about. In the first 3 commandments, God is talking first and most about our relationship with him. Now in the 4th, 5th, and 6th Commandments, God is talking about our relationships with each other.

We could talk about what God commands - The Fourth Commandment - "Honor your father and mother." Not just when or because they do something to deserve our honor, but "honor your father and mother" because in God's plan our parents represent God; it is first and foremost through father and mother that God wants to show and share his love and wisdom with us. But in this world of sin, moms and dads need help, so God has given us government to help keep us in line, and church to help teach us the heart of God. And so with the 4th Commandment - "Honor your father and mother," we include honor and obey your government, respect and listen to your church leaders.

Then we have the 5th Commandment - "Thou shalt not murder." Now before we think "this should be an easy one," what did Jesus say? "I tell you that anyone who is angry with his brother will be subject to judgment." John put it this way: "Anyone who hates his brother is a murderer, and you know that no murderer has eternal life in him." Luther pulled it together this way: "We should fear and love God that we do not hurt nor harm our neighbor in his body, but" - oh, here's where it gets tough - "help and befriend him in every bodily need." Lord, have mercy! Christ, have mercy! Lord, have mercy on us!

Then we have the 6th Commandment - "Thou shall not commit adultery." Jesus doesn't let us off easy here either, does he? "I tell you that anyone who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery with her in his heart." We live in a world that has largely written off the 6th Commandment, and what about us? We like to pick and choose, and excuse, don't we?

We could talk for hours and days about what God is commanding in these commandments. But with these commandments God isn't just commanding, God is protecting. What is he protecting? "Honor your father and mother" ... "do not commit adultery" - God is protecting family life. "Thou shalt not murder"" - God is protecting his gift of life; he's protecting our time of grace, our neighbor's time of grace.

Because God loves us, he gives us parents and family; because he loves us he looks to protect parents and family - not just from the world out there, but he looks to protect parents and family from ourselves. Because he loves us, God gives us life, and because he loves us, God looks to protect life - not just our own life, but the lives of the people around us, throughout the world - not just so that hearts keep ticking, but so that hearts worldwide are cared for - by us.

I don't always share God's interests. Growing up, I was more interested in what my parents were supposed to do for me than what I was supposed to do for them. When it comes to the government, I can be far more interested in my rights and what I can get, than in my responsibilities and what I owe my God-given

government. When it comes to church leaders, I can be far more in tune with my petty frustrations, than reflecting the heart of Jesus. With the 5th Commandment, I can be far more interested in my property rights and borders, than sharing God's interest in the well-being of my neighbors here and around the world. I can find it a whole lot easier to think someone else should take care, than to think that I should take care of others. With the 6th Commandment, it's a whole lot easier to pick on them for their sins, than to be a husband who is always more and more like Jesus - good and gentle, kind and true.

This next week won't be easy. When I think it will be, God will test me and Satan will work his way in. The good that I would, I won't. The evil I don't want to do, I'll do it again. And you? The same, right? But that isn't a reality we will just shrug off. It's an ugly reality that will sicken us inside - "what a wretch I am - who will rescue me from this body of death." More importantly, it is a reality from which Christ has rescued us!

Yes, we have God commanding us, and God condemning - the soul that sins, it shall die. But in Jesus, the same God who demands our life, he gave his life for us. In Jesus, that same God who condemns us, he speaks up for us and forgives us. In Jesus, that same God who commands us, he stepped in for us and obeyed, and he covers you with his perfect life of love.

What does that mean for us? Instead of imagining God as a scowling Father, instead of imagining God as the Father whose approval we can never have, you get to see God as a Father with

arms open and ready to hug you; you get to see and hear God as a Father smiling on you - "You are my son, my daughter, whom I love, with you I am well-pleased." Now, when we're haunted by sins of the past, instead of kicking ourselves, instead of beating ourselves up, instead of slaving to somehow make up for what we have done - we get to see Jesus as the perfect husband for his church - he gave himself for us; with water and the Word he washed us clean, without spot or wrinkle, or any other blemish; now he whispers "peace" to our hearts, and proudly presents us as his. And that's the way we get to live! We don't just shrug off sin as no big deal or the commandments as no big deal; and we don't give up on the commandments as unreasonable or impossible. With Christ and his Spirit to power us, we take on the life God gives us as the family of God.

We love God for giving us family and life. We love God for stepping in to save and protect family and life. We love God for giving us the privilege of blessing family and life. And how do we do that? We love God first and most and we love our neighbor as ourselves; we love our neighbors with the love of God. Amen.

THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT

IN OUR WORLD TODAY ... we are surrounded by hurting people. Some people hurting with no one else specifically to blame (illness, aging, ...); so many hurting because of avoidable and loveless actions or inactions of other people.

IN OUR WORSHIP TODAY ... we see that our God is a God of love, and in love he has blessed us with commandments designed to guide us in his love and to protect us and bless us with loving families and community.

The Sixth Commandment


You shall not commit adultery.

I invite you, now, to confess your sins, ask our Father for forgiveness, and commit yourselves to this struggle.






ABSOLUTION

Again I saw something meaningless under the sun:


There was a man all alone; he had neither son nor brother.

The Word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**


GOSPEL
