He couldn't be happy. He was one of the Twelve, specially chosen, with a special connection to the Miracle-Worker, the Rabbi, the Son of God himself. But he couldn't be happy unless he had more. And so he took more. He helped himself and took from the offerings given to Jesus. But he still couldn't be happy, unless he had even more. So he bitter bit at how people gave to Jesus and sold out his Savior for 30 pieces of silver. He couldn't be happy with what he had. And how did it work out for him?

He couldn't be happy. He was Absalom, one of King David's sons, royalty, rich and powerful. But he felt slighted by his dad, so he couldn't be happy. He couldn't be happy, unless he had more; he couldn't be happy, until he had his father's throne. So he slandered and bad-mouthed his dad with lies and he used false promises to make friends for himself. For a time, it looked like it would work, like he would get to be king, like he would get to be happy. But how did it work out?

He couldn't be happy. He was Ahab, King of Israel. He had cities and palaces. But his neighbor had a vineyard that he wanted for a vegetable garden. He just couldn't be happy without that vegetable garden. So lies were told, stones were thrown, blood was shed, and Naboth the neighbor was dead. And how did it work out for Ahab? No matter how cleverly he tried to hide from God's judgment, God's arrow found him.

Do you ever have those times ...

... when you just can't be happy with what you have? ... when you make yourself happy at someone else's expense? How do those times work out?

Do you ever have those times ...

... when someone else makes themselves happy at your expense? How will those times work out? Read Psalm 73 or Philippians.

They couldn't be happy ... and that's the way they died. It doesn't always look that way, does it? Ask the writer of Psalm 73 - it seemed the liars and the cheats, the wicked and the bullies, the rich and the powerful, got ahead at the

expense of the good and godly. We seem to live in a world that more and more thinks the only way to be happy is to get ahead, and the only way to get ahead is to get ahead at someone else's expense.

To get ahead "at someone else's expense" may be the law of the jungle, but it goes directly against "love your neighbor as yourself."

Instead of "get ahead at someone else's expense" and take what you want - "Thou shalt not steal." In his Large Catechism, Luther wrote that if we do take and steal to get ahead at someone else's expense, what should we expect? God will find a way to take it all back, at our expense. But if we find the heart to give and help others at our expense, what can we look forward to? God will see our gifts to help others as loans to him that he will pay back to us with a great and wonderful reward. There's so much more we could say about the Seventh Commandment. Let me just say: "To get ahead at someone else's expense" doesn't fit "love your neighbor as your self." "Thou shalt not steal."

With the 7th Commandment, what kind of sins come to mind? What kind of 7th Commandment temptations might be busy inside us? (Start with this - whose money, stuff, house ... do you have? For what purpose?)

Then there's the Eighth Commandment. "Thou shalt not bear false testimony against your neighbor." What does that have to do with "getting ahead at someone else's expense?" When we want attention, what's one of the easiest ways to get attention? When we want respect, what's one of the easiest ways to get "respect"? When we want to get our way, what works? False testimony - twist the truth, lie about somebody; make someone else look bad so you can look better. Twist the truth, lie about somebody, so you can get your way - at their expense. But what if that nasty thing we have to say is true? Would you want it said about you, even if it were true? "Love our neighbor as yourself."

What groups of people would we like to exempt from God's 8th Commandment protections?

Now we get to the hard part. "You shall not covet your neighbor's house. You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, workers, or animals or

anything that belongs to your neighbor." With "Thou shalt not covet," what's the first thing that comes to mind? "Covet? What does it mean to covet?" The Hebrew Bible word means to desire, to strongly desire; the word itself doesn't tell us whether it's a good desire or an evil desire, just to desire. "Do not desire anything or anyone who belongs to your neighbor."

Doesn't seem reasonable, does it?

Agree / Disagree

The 9th and 10th Commandments are impossible and God designed them to be impossible.

We live in a world that feeds and fuels and twists our desires to want more, to think we need more, to think we can't be happy or successful or whatever ... unless we get what we want. Our screens - tv screens, social media screens - don't help, do they? I want so bad to say, "My screens suck me in," but the truth is that I let myself get sucked in. We let ourselves get sucked in to wanting more and more, to do what they do, to have what they have. Whether we need it or not, whether it's good for us or not, whether we can afford it or not, whether it fits our values - that really doesn't matter to the world out there; they're just looking to feed and fuel and twist our wants so they can get what they want. And soon, whether we need it or not, whether it's good for us or not, whether we can afford it or not, whether it fits our values or not - soon none of that matters in here [our hearts], because in our hearts is a great, deep, dark hole of want fed and fueled and twisted by the world, so we can't be happy unless we get more and more of what we want ... even if it's at someone else's expense ... because "I can't be happy if I'm not getting what I want."

Oh, that puts us in an awful, miserable place, doesn't it? Not only do we feel awful and miserable because we're not getting what we want, but we can do some really awful, miserable things to the people around us to get what we want - like Judas and Absalom and Ahab. Worse, when we're in that awful, miserable place - "I can't be happy because I'm not getting what I want" - what are we saying about God and all his good blessings? When Adam and Eve just had to have the fruit God said wasn't for them to eat, when Adam and Eve just had to have it, what were they saying about God? "God's holding out on us." And what were they saying about the paradise of blessings God had for them? God's

paradise, all the blessings God had for them - God and all that he had for them - "Not good enough."

When I can't be happy unless I get what I want ... when I can't be happy unless people give me what I want, what am I making what I want? I am making it or them to be the source of my happiness, the controllers of my happiness. I am making it and them to be my gods - the gods I expect to make life right for me.

When God says "Thou shalt not covet," he's not looking to be unreasonable. He's looking to protect me from a dangerous, toxic wanting; a dangerous, toxic wanting that not only makes ourselves feel awful and miserable; but a dangerous, toxic wanting that does awful, miserable things to the people around us; a dangerous, toxic wanting that eats away and destroys our appreciation for God.

God has an answer for our dangerous, toxic wanting - an answer better than giving us whatever we want, an answer better than giving us what can't really satisfy. God's answer for our dangerous, toxic wanting isn't just to let us loose living the law the jungle living at each other's expense. God's answer is Jesus. Jesus is the answer for that deep, dark, empty hole of want inside us. How so? Jesus has what guilty hearts and shame-filled hearts need to be right. Jesus has what ignored and put-off and lonely hearts need to be special. Jesus has what broken and aching hearts need to be healed. Jesus has what our hearts need.

If you're ready for a deep dive, what are your deepest needs and hurts? How do you try to satisfy those needs and heal those hurts apart from Jesus? How does that work out?

For those deepest needs / hurts, what does Jesus offer? How will that work out?

In Jesus, we aren't just what our successes or our failures might say about us; in Jesus, you are what God says of you: "You are forgiven; covered with the right life of Jesus, you are right for life in heaven." Let me put it another way. In Jesus, we aren't just what our things or our popularity say about us; in Jesus, you are a specially chosen and loved child of God; in Jesus, you are so special, God says to you: "You are my son, my daughter; with you I am well-pleased." Let me

put it another way. In Jesus, we aren't just broken hearts with messed-up lives; in Jesus, you are the people ... you are God's success story; you are the person through whom God is determined to share his love and blessing.

I know I don't always feel that way about myself. And when I don't it sure can be easy to think I can't be happy unless I'm getting what I want. And it sure can be easy to think that somebody else should be doing something to make me happy. All because I'm not feeling the way I want to feel.

But what God has for me in Jesus is more real than my feelings. What God has for me in Jesus is more lasting than my feelings. And what God has for me in Jesus is more satisfying than what I think I need.

I wish I could say this better, but after being sick, my brain is still addled. Think of Judas and Absalom and Kings David and Ahab - and all the other people you know - who couldn't be happy unless they got what they wanted at someone else's expense. Think of those times you can't be happy unless you get this or that. Now think of Jesus - "who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame." Jesus - for the joy of having you with him in heaven - what did he give up? What did he do? It wasn't at our expense. Jesus - for the joy of having you with him in heaven - endured the cross, scorning its shame. And where is he now? Set at God's right hand in heaven! Some day, we get to be with him! That may not put a smile on our face every day all day, but it sure sets us up for something better - Joy with Jesus. Amen.

What is the difference between happiness and joy?

FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT

IN OUR WORLD TODAY ... it is so easy to get sucked into the lie that the only or easiest or best (or simply, easier) way to get ahead is at someone else's expense. And so theft, slander, covetousness are not only excused but encouraged.

IN OUR WORSHIP TODAY ... our God has a higher standard and way of life - instead of looking out first and most for self, we look out for each other. But what about our FOMO fear (fear of missing out) or our fear that someone else might get ahead? We go back to the First Commandment - "fear, love, and trust in God above all things." Or better, we go to our God's long list of promises and find Philippians 4:19 contentment - "And my God will meet all your needs according to his glorious riches in Christ Jesus." - I have God with all his promises and blessings! What am I worrying about?!"

CONFESSION

Brothers and sisters in Christ, during the days of Lent, we fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of God.

The time of Lent reminds us that to know Christ and the power of his resurrection, we must also know the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death.

As disciples of the Lord Jesus, we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and neighbor. A review of God's Holy Ten Commandments can help us. This week we review the Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, and Tenth Commandments.

The Seventh Commandment

You shall not steal.

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God that we do not take our neighbor's money or property, or get it by dishonest dealing, but help him to improve and protect his property and means of income.

The Eighth Commandment

You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, or give him a bad name, but defend him, speak well of him, and take his words and actions in the kindest possible way.

The Ninth Commandment

You shall not covet your neighbor's house.

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God that we do not scheme to get our neighbor's inheritance or house, or obtain it by a show of right, but do all we can to help him keep it.


The Tenth Commandment


You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, workers, animals, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

We should fear and love God that we do not force or entice away our neighbor's spouse, workers, or animals, but urge them to stay and do their duty.
