Sermon followed by Service - May 25, 2025 – Acts 1:1-11

"Why? Why am I here?" You've heard that question before, haven't you? We hear it in us and around us. "Why? Why am I here?" And then what? "I don't have any friends." "I can't do what I want." "I'm just a bother." So "Why? Why am I here?" When you feel sicker than a dog and broken beyond fixing - "Why? Why am I here?" When your heart aches, and you feel no peace, no hope, no future - "Why? Why am I here?" Oh, when things get better you might forget for a while, but when trouble comes back, when things don't go your way, the question comes back: "Why? Why am I here?"

Or maybe it's not trouble, your trouble, that has you wondering "Why am I here?" It could be - Life is good. Your grass is green. Your flowers are blooming. If you see any yellow in your yard, it's not dandelions, it's tulips and daffodils brightening your day. Then you see that homeless guy. Or you're making your vacation plans, plans to go out, plans to get away, and then a friend tells you how broke and broken they are. You can't help but see how good you have it, when so many people don't have it nearly so good, and you wonder: "Why? Why am I here?"

Oh, that can be a hard question. Sometimes it whips us with guilt. Sometimes it crushes with commands and demands - "I should this; I should that." Sometimes it's a question we run from, duck and hide from. "Why? Why am I here?"

You might be wondering: "What in the world does that have to do with Christ's ascension?" Well, I'm glad you asked. Usually with Ascension Day we ask: "Why did Jesus ascend into heaven?" But our lesson doesn't answer that question. Our lesson doesn't even try to answer the question: "Why did Jesus ascend?" Instead our lesson answers the question: "Why did Jesus leave us behind?" Or, in different words: "Why? Why am I here?"

Jesus' disciples headed into today thinking they knew the answer. They thought they were here to rule the world with Jesus. They thought Jesus was about to set up a Kingdom of God on Earth, a kingdom where Jesus would rid the world of evil and set up his people for a life of peace and prosperity with God. And they, the disciples, would get to rule with Jesus.

But Jesus didn't come to set up some earthly kingdom of peace and prosperity, and no matter how we might wish for that, Jesus wasn't about to fall into the trap of treating the here and now as more important than the there and then of heaven. So Jesus left for heaven to rule his way, and he left his disciples behind. He left us behind. Why? I'm not going to tell you yet.

Why not? First, we have to beat up on the disciples a bit. When you hear the disciples ask: "Are you at this time going to set up your kingdom?" don't you wonder: "Why couldn't they get it?" Time and again Jesus had been steering his disciples away from the idea of an earthly kingdom of peace and prosperity. But the disciples just couldn't get it. We might get judgy: "Why couldn't they get it?" And then what? What do we

do? We might live like life is about green grass and projects around the house. We might live like life is about getting away on the weekend, getting away in retirement. We might live like life is about ball games and video games. All those things can be great. But when we live like that's what life is about, then who are we to beat up on the disciples for not getting what life is about? Or we might think that life is about working peace and prosperity for our family. Wanting to provide peace and prosperity for our family can be a wonderful thing. But if we think setting up a kingdom of peace and prosperity for our family is what life is about, then we are just as wrong-headed as the disciples.

Life isn't about setting up a kingdom of peace and prosperity in this world for ourselves, for our family, for our country. Life in this world isn't about us. And when we think it is, that's idolatry - putting ourselves in place of God. When we think that life is about peace and prosperity for us and our people, that's when and that's why we have such a hard time with the question: "Why? Why am I here?"

So, "Why? Why am I here? Why did Jesus leave us behind in this world?" The answer Jesus gives isn't a command. The answer Jesus gives is a life of promise and privilege. Jesus left us behind to be witnesses. Witnesses of what? Some days we might think: "Witnesses of trouble? Witnesses of evil?" No, Jesus has left us behind in this world to be his witnesses - to tell his story.

We get to tell the truth of Jesus. In a world that is so broken and messed up, we might want to tell people how to clean up and fix their lives. Or better we might want to tell people about Jesus' miracle power and his love to clean up our messes and to fix what's broken, and make life right for us. That can be better. It can be a wonderful, beautiful thing to tell people about Jesus' miracle power and love; it can be great to share that Jesus can clean up our messes and fix our broken and make life better for us. But Jesus is concerned about something more than how life is going for us. Jesus is especially concerned about our relationship with God, our broken relationship with God. Jesus didn't come just to make life easier for us, Jesus came to give us life with God. That means Jesus had to do something more than teach us how to live right. And he had to do something more than fix our world so we can have fun in the sun. Jesus came to reconcile us with God, to resolve God's judgment - "the soul that sins, it shall die." That's why Jesus didn't just teach behavior and do miracles, but Jesus went to the cross. Why? To take our place as guilty, to pay for our sin, to set us right with God ... to set us right to be blessed by God.

Some times we want to skip right to that "blessed by God" talk and skip over the sin and guilt talk. Why? Sin and guilt talk can be terribly personal, right? We'd rather talk about Jesus' miracles and love, what he can do for us to make life better. But sin and guilt is more consuming than cancer, more debilitating than a broken body, more destructive than tornadoes, more deadly than death. How so? When people try to hide and deny, when they try to blame and excuse, what happens? They leave a trail of crushed and broken hearts and lives. But with Jesus, you have for you, and you have for them, what guilty and crushed and torn hearts need to hear. You get to hear for yourself and tell

others how Jesus has taken your guilt and their guilt as his own. You get to hear for yourself and tell others how Jesus died for your sin and theirs. You get to hear for yourself and tell others how Jesus lives with this promise for you and for them: "Peace! Your sins are forgiven you. Peace! God has a place for you in his heart. With Jesus, you're right by God and he will make life right for you." And then we get to share all those promises about God's love and care as true for me and true for you.

That's why we're here. In a world where life can be so broken, in a world where death can seem so all-powerful, we get to show and tell the truth about Jesus and all that Jesus has done for us.

That's why I'm here. That's why you're here. I'm not saying we'll all be like Peter and Paul speaking up before crowds. But the Spirit of Christ is at work setting us up to tell the most important thing that can ever be told - the truth, the Good Friday truth, the Easter truth, the life and the love of Jesus. And then, someday, Jesus will come back and take us to be with him. But now, he has left us here. "Why? Why are we here?"

That question is huge for me right now. Last month, you surprised me, reminding me that I've been here 25 years now. This past week, my doctor told me I'm not getting any younger. When we hit milestones, as we graduate from one day to another, one year to another, it's good for us to ask ourselves - "Why? Why am I here?" Not just: "Am I enjoying myself?" Not just: "What do I want to be doing with my life?" But "Am I living God's purpose for my life?" "How can I better live God's

purpose for my life? How can I better help St. John to live God's purpose for us?" That's not just a question for me to think about. It's a question for all of us to think about. Why did Jesus leave us behind? Why does Jesus have us here?

A good, godly answer to those questions demands more honesty with ourselves than closing our eyes and ears. Those questions take more thinking than "whoo-dee-whoo-dee-whoo." They need more time than a snap of the fingers. It can be hard to look at ourselves - "How am I living God's purpose for my life?" It can be hard to think about - "What needs to change in my life? What do I need to change in my life to better live God's purpose?" It can take time to think and time to work it out. Time that we're not especially good at using.

But that's why God is giving us time, isn't it? Not just to get cozy and to make cozy. We're here to be part of the great things God is doing in Jesus. We're here to help people see Jesus? Amen.

IN OUR WORLD TODAY ... how many people in your circles know their purpose, their God-given purpose in life? How many are living their own purpose in life? How many know why they are here in this world? Here's where it can get dangerous - how many of those people who aren't living God's purpose are drawing you into their purpose for life? Here's where it may be sad - how many of those people (without godly purpose) are we attracting into God's purpose for life?

IN OUR WORSHIP TODAY ... we see Jesus' purpose in life here and in heaven. And we see the purpose Jesus has for us while we are here.

FIRST READING Acts 1:1–11

In my former book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus began to do and to teach until the day he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles he had chosen. After his suffering, he presented himself to them and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God. On one occasion, while he was eating with them, he gave them this command: "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about. For John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit."


Then they gathered around him and asked him, "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?"

He said to them: "It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

After he said this, he was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight.

They were looking intently up into the sky as he was going, when suddenly two men dressed in white stood beside them. "Men of Galilee," they said, "why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven."
