Who here likes to go fishing? Who likes fishing stories? I know some of you just light up when you get to talk about fishing. You can tell us the when, the where, the how many and how big, the bait you used - and those lunkers ... they keep on growing, don't they?

Today, we have a fishing story. It's a good one, but as far as fish stories in the Bible go, it's not the biggest. Jonah getting swallowed, saved, and spit up on land by a giant fish - that beats this one. Jesus splitting 2 small fish and feeding 5000 ... the time Jesus gave Peter, James, and John - the professional fishermen - a lesson on fishing, and then told them - "You will be fishers of men" - those fish stories beat this one. Then there's the question - was this a miracle? A miracle sighting, a miracle catch, a miracle fish on a miracle fire? We're not told, but if it was a miracle or miracles, it's not the biggest or the best of Jesus' miracles. Any of those other fish miracles beat these. As far as fish stories go, as far as miracles go - this one doesn't seem to be the biggest or the best, does it? But there is something in this fish story that is so good to hear, too good not to share.

Remember, this isn't a "once upon a time" story. This is real Easter history. Put yourself in the place of the disciples. For three years your life has been following Jesus, watching Jesus, soaking in Jesus' words, his life, his love, his power. You've heard Jesus say big things - "I am the Good Shepherd. I lay down my life for my sheep ... and I will take it back up again. ... My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one can snatch them out of my hand." You've heard Jesus promise you big things - life, a purpose, a place in his kingdom, a place in the big things of God. You've been part of Jesus' big things; you've been there for Jesus' big miracles;

you've worked miracles yourself. And then what? Just when things were coming together, Jesus was arrested, and you ran. Jesus was nailed to a cross, crucified, and you cowered. Jesus was buried, and you hid in fear. Your Jesus, your life, your purpose, your place in the big things of God - all dead. Until you heard the impossible: "Christ is risen!" Until you saw, until you heard the unbelievable: Jesus standing right in front of you - "Peace be with you." Now what? Jesus says: "Go to Galilee and wait for me there." You go to Galilee. You wait. But now what?

The Peter in you says: "I can't just sit. I've got to do something. I've got to do something useful. I'm going out to fish." A half dozen of you join him. You do the hard work of a professional fisherman. You get up off your bottoms. You work the boat; you work the nets; you do the work. And what do you get? Nothing.

It's not supposed to work that way, is it? But so often it does, doesn't it? You step up, you step forward to do something useful with your life. You do the work. You cast the nets. You invite for Easter. You make phone calls for a work project, a ministry project. You step up, you step forward to do something useful with your life. And what do you get? No response. No response to your invitations. No response to your phone messages. No response to your encouragements. No response, just an empty net. Oh, that can be so discouraging - "Why bother?!"

Why bother? The empty net might not stay empty. There's more than just you doing the work. There's more than just the few of you. Watching off to the side is some guy. He wouldn't have to be there; he wouldn't have to be watching you. He's got a nice, cozy place where he could sit back and relax. But he's here; he's watching; he's interested in you and what you're doing. He sees the empty net,

but he doesn't give up. At just the right time, in just the right place, he nudges: "Try again, on the other side of the boat." I want to say: "I've already tried and tried and tried. And look what it's gotten me. I'm tired. I'm done. Just let me go home." But you don't. You don't get snarky. And you don't quit. You try again, on the other side of the boat. And what do you find? More fish than you can haul into your boat. Not just small ones, biggins. One-hundred-fifty-three big ones.

Why? Was it finally the right time, the right place, the right way? That's what I'd like to know. John, the disciple John, tells us something else: "It is the Lord." And he doesn't just fill our nets. He has something cooking for us on shore. He has time for us. He has a place for us with him. He has a place for what we do, a place for us to bring our something to the table.

Have you ever been swallowed by a fish and spit up on shore? Me neither. Have you ever had you and 5000 of your neighbors fed by 2 small fish and 5 loaves of bread? Me neither. Have you ever caught so many fish that your boat almost sank? Me neither. Have you ever got up, stood up, stepped forward to do something useful, something useful with the time Jesus is giving you? And then hauled in an empty net? Me too. That's why I'm preaching on this fish story. There are times we might haul in an empty net like Peter and the others. But like Peter and the others, we have someone watching us, someone interested in what we're doing, someone nudging, encouraging - "try again." That someone nudging isn't a bother; he's your brother - he's Jesus Christ.

When he nudges us, he's not looking to guilt us into doing this or that. He's not looking to guilt us into stepping up or returning that phone message. No, instead of piling on the guilt, Jesus took our

guilt. The guilt that says, "Too little, too late," the guilt that says, "after what you've done, you think Jesus has a place for you and your stuff?" the guilt that says, "after what you haven't done, you think you get to nudge others?" ... instead of guilting us, Jesus took our guilt. He took your guilt and mine all the way to the cross where he paid the price to set you right with God - right for life with God, right for life in heaven, but not just that. Jesus set you right with God to live a useful life here on earth - a life doing the things of God, a life working the work of God, a life sharing the heart of God. Today, that Jesus - who gave his life for you - he lives! He's here, and he's watching us and what we do. Watching us and the way we step up to do something useful in his kingdom.

And what does he want you to know? Sometimes when we step up to do something useful, we might bring in an empty net. Sometimes when we step up to say something useful, we might get no response. But what does Jesus do? He nudges us to try again. And when we try again, what might we find? Jesus just might fill our nets in a way we'd never expect.

I almost didn't preach on this text. But these past months, when I saw this lesson on the calendar, Jesus nudged me, nudged me with this lesson. And now this past week Jesus has been nudging me, nudging me through you - "Don't let the empty net get you down; step up and try again. Don't let the empty net get you down; who knows how or when Jesus might fill it." Don't let the empty net get you down; let's step up, speak up, and give Jesus the opportunity to fill our nets. Amen.

DIVINE SERVICE II

IN OUR WORLD TODAY ... we have so many distractions, so many frustrations, that it can be tempting to give up, tempting to go and do something else ... than do what Jesus has given us to do - to work his work and to wait for his blessing.

IN OUR WORSHIP TODAY ... we see Jesus in control, watching and guiding our work, and in his time, providing his blessing. And we are nudged, we are encouraged, in our working with Jesus and in our waiting with Jesus. We heard it on Easter - our labor in the Lord is not in vain!

GOSPEL John 21:1–14

Afterward Jesus appeared again to his disciples, by the Sea of Galilee. It happened this way: Simon Peter, Thomas (also known as Didymus), Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two other disciples were together. "I'm going out to fish," Simon Peter told them, and they said, "We'll go with you." So they went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

Early in the morning, Jesus stood on the shore, but the disciples did not realize that it was Jesus.

He called out to them, "Friends, haven't you any fish?" "No," they answered.

He said, "Throw your net on the right side of the boat and you will find some." When they did, they were unable to haul the net in because of the large number of fish.

Then the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" As soon as Simon Peter heard him say, "It is the Lord," he wrapped his outer garment around him (for he had taken it off) and jumped into the water. The other disciples followed in the boat, towing the net full of fish, for they were not far from shore, about a hundred yards. When they landed, they saw a fire of burning coals there with fish on it, and some bread.

Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish you have just caught." So Simon Peter climbed back into the boat and dragged the net ashore. It was full of large fish, 153, but even with so many the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." None of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. Jesus came, took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This was now the third time Jesus appeared to his disciples after he was raised from the dead.

Home Missions Approves New Mission Starts and Enhancements

On April 3 and 4, WELS Board for Home Missions approved 11 new missions and enhancements for the synodwide 100 Missions in 10 Years initiative.

"Each of the five new starts is backed by a mature, mission-minded core group that has been actively sharing the gospel in their communities—even before seeking formal support," says Rev. Mark Gabb, Home Missions administrator. "That kind of groundwork helps lay a strong foundation for long-term gospel ministry."

Thanks to the generous gifts received over the past year, WELS Home Missions is also in a financial position to approve up to five additional new missions this fall. Gabb notes, "Giving core groups additional time to prepare their requests will strengthen their proposals for fall."

In the end, Home Missions approved five new starts and six enhancements. The five new mission starts include:

Arlington, Tenn.: Arlington is on the brink of rapid growth with Ford Motor Company set to build a new plant for electric truck production. Since 2022, the South Atlantic District Mission Board has been working with a dedicated group of 60 members and Pastor Jim Turriff from Gloria Dei, Memphis, who plan to relocate and establish a fresh start in Arlington under a new name.

Erie, Colo.: Erie has experienced a 55 percent population increase from 2010 to 2020, with continued growth expected. A core group of ten adults has been gathering for fellowship and Bible study while attending local festivals to share its plans for a new church.

Jarrell, Texas: Jarrell is a rapidly growing town north of Austin. For the past three years, Pastor Don Patterson has been working with a core group of 11, which began holding weekly worship in October 2024. The group has identified 90 prospects, many of whom they connected with by volunteering at the local food pantry.

Madison, Wis.: A core group of 14 adults, familiar with the area, has been working together since 2022—meeting regularly for Bible study and ministry planning—and has also secured a rental space for worship and community activities. A new mission plant in the center of rapidly growing urban Madison would allow WELS to reach an entirely new demographic.

San Tan Valley, Ariz.: Since 2022, the Arizona-California District Mission Board has been working with Heritage in Gilbert, Ariz., to plant a new mission in rapidly growing San Tan Valley. A core group of 26 adults has been gathering regularly for Bible study and community events. In October 2024, they began holding regular worship services and have already identified 127 prospects interested in learning more about the new church. The Board for Home Missions is also financially supporting ministry enhancements for Christ, Clarksville, Md. (restart); Living Word, Petaluma, Calif. (restart); Living Word, Waukesha, Wis.; Redeemer, Edna, Texas; Risen Savior, Lakewood Ranch, Fla.; and Saint Mark Mankato, Mankato, Minn.

Looking ahead, Gabb shares, "We have limitless opportunities with a limited amount of resources. The Board for Home Missions is actively looking at ways to reduce costs, even in the current economic climate, so that more people can be reached with the gospel." Gabb continues, "It's all about being faithful stewards of the resources God has given us. We will continue working diligently to aggressively reach the lost with the gospel while also being faithful stewards. We trust God will bless our efforts."
