Sermon followed by Service - June 1, 2025 - Acts 1:12-26

"Sit still and wait." Not easy, is it? We've been training and practicing from before we were born. Waiting inside and kicking. Then when we were born, we added screaming to our kicking. We were hungry. Mom whispered, "Wait just a moment," and what did we do? Did we sit still and wait? Not a chance. Some years later, Dad made that big mistake; he bought that video game thing; he thought it would be good family fun, until he said: "Sit still and wait your turn." Then what happened? We didn't sit still and wait, did we? Then when we got googlyeyed in love, and we didn't get the letter, the call, the text, the smile we were waiting for, how easy was it to just sit still and wait? Now when we get old, when the Dr. Office receptionist says: "Sit and Wait," and then the nurse says, "Sit and wait," that's just the start, isn't it? Then it's sit and wait for the tests, sit and wait for the results, sit and wait for the follow-up, and then sit and wait on hold with the insurance company for how long? Sit and wait - we get a lot of practice, don't we? And it's not easy, is it?

In our lesson, it's time to wait. Now Jesus doesn't tell his disciples to "Sit still and wait," but he does tell them to "Stay put [stay in Jerusalem] and wait." And what do they do? They could have done the "brother" thing and gotten into fights and arguments with each other (they had plenty of experience with that). They could have done the fret and worry thing (and they were pretty good at that). They could have given up and gone off and done their own thing ("I've been waiting for this guy for three years and he's still always telling us to 'wait""). Instead,

what does Luke tell us? They did the hard thing; they stayed and they waited. They didn't know how long they would have to wait. They didn't know what was coming after their wait. Yes, Jesus had told them he would send them his Holy Spirit, but Jesus had also made it clear that trouble was coming.

When you're waiting and waiting and you don't know what's coming, what happens? It can be so easy to get persnickety with each other, to get demanding of each other, to fret and worry, to give up, to get distracted and join the world in their distractions, to live distracted instead of waiting with the heart and mind of Jesus. But the apostles and those with them, they didn't do the easy thing. Instead, they stayed and waited.

And they show us how to wait - "They all joined together constantly in prayer." What do you think they prayed? Maybe a little bit of "How long, O Lord?" Perhaps some "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Or, "Lord, I believe, help my unbelief." Maybe some "Now Thank We All Our God!" Or "Come, Holy Spirit, and kindle in us the fire of your love!" What else might they have prayed? I imagine a whole lot of "Take My Life and Let it Be Consecrated, Lord, to Thee!"

We're not told what they prayed, but we are told how they prayed. They kept on praying; they weren't one and done; Jesus was giving them time to pray, so they kept on praying. Great reminder, isn't it? We get to use our waiting time as praying time. When I'm late, and I'm stuck waiting at the red light, or for the train, or in the construction zone, instead of ______, Jesus is giving me time to pray. When the world around me is late,

instead of thinking how they are making me wait, Jesus is giving me time to wait, Jesus is giving me time to pray. When I'm waiting for whatever might come next, instead of grumping and grousing about the wait, Jesus is giving us time to pray.

And so the apostles and all who were with them prayed. How? They prayed "together," "with one mind." How did that happen? I don't think it happened by accident. I imagine they shared their fears and worries with each other. I imagine they shared their hopes with each other. Sitting and waiting - they didn't have a TV in the room ... sitting and waiting - they didn't have phones in their hands ... sitting and waiting with each other they got to talk with each other; they got to listen to each other; they got to be there for each other. Now, what do we all know? People sharing their hopes and fears with each other doesn't necessarily get people on the same page, sometimes it just gets us into a fight. So the apostles must have had something else to bring them together and hold them together.

What was that? Jesus and the Word of Jesus. I'm not just making that up. In the next part of our lesson, did you notice how Peter brought the people together? Peter didn't just say: "I think," or "I hope," but Peter pointed to Scripture - "This situation we're in, God knew about it long before we did. This situation we're in, God had a plan for it long before us. This situation we're in, I don't need to tell you what I think or I hope or I say, because with this situation we're in - this is what God says." "This is what God says" brought the apostles together. "This is what God says" is what brings and keeps us together. And when we fill our hearts and minds with "This is what God

says," "This is what God says" can shape our hearts and our prayers so that we pray together in a way that we're blessed together.

What does all that mean for us? When it's our turn to sit and wait, we can obsess over how long we have to wait, we can wrap ourselves up in our own thinking - we can stoke our fears and worries with all that can go wrong, we can stroke our egos and get all judgy at the world around us because they don't think like we do ... when it's our turn to sit and wait, we can distract ourselves by joining the world in its distracted living. (In Bible Class we'll talk about this - what is the difference between purposeful distraction that is good and godly? And empty distraction that is neither good nor godly?)

Or, we can let our lesson show us a better way to sit and wait. Sit and wait together with each other. Sit and wait together with Jesus. Pray with each other and fill each other with Jesus.

Did you notice what kind of Jesus we have in our lesson? Did you notice what kind of Jesus we get to share? An Easter Jesus! The Jesus who faced the worst of this world and came out on top! The Jesus who faced death and came out alive! The Jesus who faced God's curse and came out blessed!

In our waiting times, it doesn't matter what we're waiting for, we don't need to fret and worry, we have Jesus as Lord - our wait isn't to see what trouble will do; our wait is to see what Jesus will do. In our waiting times, when trouble and guilt have us wondering what God has in store for us, waiting for the other

shoe to drop, waiting for God to drop the hammer on us, with Jesus we aren't waiting for judgment, with Jesus and his cross we have forgiveness, so with Jesus we aren't waiting for payback, we're waiting for redemption and deliverance. What does that mean? In our waiting times, when "who knows when death will overtake me," who knows when judgment day will come, with Jesus, we don't need to be afraid of death or the judgment, we have Jesus coming for us to take us to be with him in heaven. That's right! Our wait in this world isn't just for death; our wait is for heaven! Keeping our Easter Jesus in front us - it sure gives a whole different feel to our waiting times, doesn't it?

Did you notice how I managed to skip over our lesson's most confusing verses? Or how I managed to skip over our lesson's most distracting verses? Or how I managed to skip over our lesson's most interesting verses? Don't worry; just wait - for Family Bible Hour. Amen.

THE SERVICE

IN OUR WORLD TODAY ... we sit and wait. But that's not all. Our world trains us to be distracted, to distract ourselves from good, godly, purposeful waiting. How does the world distract you from good, godly, purposeful waiting?

IN OUR WORSHIP TODAY ... Christ and his church show us good, godly, purposeful waiting - the kind of waiting that God blesses!

FIRST READING Acts 1:12–26

Then the apostles returned to Jerusalem from the hill called the Mount of Olives, a Sabbath day's walk from the city. When they arrived, they went upstairs to the room where they were staying. Those present were Peter, John, James and Andrew; Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew; James son of Alphaeus and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. They all joined together constantly in prayer, along with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with his brothers.

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (a group numbering about a hundred and twenty) and said, "Brothers and sisters, the Scripture had to be fulfilled in which the Holy Spirit spoke long ago through David concerning Judas, who served as guide for those who arrested Jesus. He was one of our number and shared in our ministry."

(With the payment he received for his wickedness, Judas bought a field; there he fell headlong, his body burst open and all his intestines spilled out. Everyone in Jerusalem heard about this, so they called that field in their language Akeldama, that is, Field of Blood.)

"For," said Peter, "it is written in the Book of Psalms:

"'May his place be deserted; let there be no one to dwell in it," and,

"'May another take his place of leadership."

Therefore it is necessary to choose one of the men who have been with us the whole time the Lord Jesus was living among us, beginning from John's baptism to the time when Jesus was taken up from us. For one of these must become a witness with us of his resurrection."

So they nominated two men: Joseph called Barsabbas (also known as Justus) and Matthias. Then they prayed, "Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which of these two you have chosen to take over this apostolic ministry, which Judas left to go where he belongs." Then they cast lots, and the lot fell to Matthias; so he was added to the eleven apostles.

If you are insulted because of the name of Christ, you are blessed, for the Spirit of glory and of God rests on you. If you suffer, it should not be as a murderer or thief or any other kind of criminal, or even as a meddler. However, if you suffer as a Christian, do not be ashamed, but praise God that you bear that name.

For it is time for judgment to begin with God's household; and if it begins with us, what will the outcome be for those who do not obey the gospel of God?Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you.

Be alert and of sober mind. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. Resist him, standing firm in the faith, because you know that the family of believers throughout the world is undergoing the same kind of sufferings.

And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast. To him be the power for ever and ever. Amen.
