Sermon followed by Service - June 22, 2025 - Acts 2:42-47

How well are you plugged in? The fire department is picky about plug-ins. They don't want to see this kind of extension cord around here; they want to see heavy-duty plug-ins. And they're really not too fired up on this kind of extension cord either; they want to see circuit breakers. They want us to be plugged-in right. Why? They want to keep us safe.

Our sound system consultant is picky about plug-ins, too. He wants everything that plugs in to the sound system to be on a completely separate circuit from our lights and anything else. He wants us to be plugged in right. Why? At home, what happens to your lights when your refrigerator or furnace comes on? Your lights dim. And what happens to the sound on your old alarm clock radio? Snap, crackle, pop. That's why our sound man is picky about plug-ins - he wants pure power to come through.

Our lesson today is about plug-ins and the power of the church. Our lesson shows us what can happen when the church is plugged in right.

You might remember from last week, by the power of his Word and Baptism, God plugged 3000 people into his church in one day. Then what? "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer." What kind of plugging in do we have there? God's people plugging in to the power of God in word and worship, plugging into the power and peace of Christ in the breaking of bread, the Lord's Supper, God's people plugging in

to God praying for more power and peace. And plugged in to Christ, God granted their prayers.

At the same time, there was another way the people were plugged in. They were plugged in to each other. "All the believers were together and had everything in common. Selling their possessions and goods, they gave to anyone as he had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God." The people of God connected as the family of God. They took care of each other as family. They ate together as family. And praising God they encouraged each other and filled each other up with Jesus.

And what happened? The people plugged in to God became a people of peace and power, love and hope. Plugged in with each other God worked that peace and power, that love and hope back and forth, round and round in the church. And that peace and power, that love and hope became like a magnet that drew people in. The people outside the church liked what they saw in the church. They wanted to be plugged in to that same peace and power of Jesus. "And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

Now for some self-reflection. Are we giving God the same opportunity to do that for us? Are we devoted to being plugged in to God? Devoted like that early church, getting together to dig into the Bible together, getting together to share the Bible together? If so, why aren't more of us in Bible class and Sunday

school? Are we already so filled with Jesus that he can't do any more for us? Or have we let ourselves get so plugged in to the world that plugging into God's Word just gets put off?

Something else we could ask ourselves is: "are we as picky about our plug-ins as God is?" Jesus said: "Watch out for false prophets ... they're dangerous to your faith." Now when Jesus said "watch out for false teachers" he wasn't suggesting that false teaching is like sugar and salt and fat; he wasn't just saying "moderation is the key." To make it clear, Jesus had Paul say: "Stay away from them." "Stay away from them" ... don't plug into the church group, the Bible teachers, the youth group that isn't true to the Bible. Don't plug into the "god-friendly" groups out there - the Masons, the Elks, the Scouts - that teach a different god, a Christ-less god, and a Christ-less way to be right with God.

I know that doesn't go over with everyone. Some people say something like this: "It's better for my child to hang out with a false-teaching youth group than to have them hang out with trouble makers." Jesus knows logic better than that; he knows a false either-or proposition when he hears it. He says: "instead of compromising with the false, do the right thing and plug into the truth." That doesn't always go over real big. Given a choice between sacrificing for the truth and plugging in to something popular and successful, what is our culture more likely to choose? The dangerous thing is - that's not just the world's culture, more and more that's the church's culture. More and more people think that a bit of compromise on teaching - a little bit of "whatever" - is what God's people need to face these hard

times. Read Jesus' letters to his church in Revelation. Instead of accepting compromise over truth as good for the church, Jesus shows compromise over truth is one of the devil's ways to curse the church.

So, how well are you plugged in to God? How picky are you about how you plug in to God? When the fire department warns us about extension cords, we might think "yea, yea, yea." When the sound guy tells us he doesn't want the balcony piano and the balcony piano light plugged in to the same outlet, we might think "yea, yea, yea." We can train ourselves to ignore the warnings. But why? Why settle for less than a heavy-duty plugin with Christ? Why settle for a less-than-pure plug-in with Christ? Why settle when Jesus offers the peace and the power, the hope and the love we see in our lesson? Those people couldn't hear enough of God's Word; they couldn't share enough of God's love.

Why? They loved to hear it, and they loved to share it "Plugged into Christ, you have Christ's cross to pay for your sin;
you are forgiven. Plugged into Christ, you have Christ's holiness
as your holiness - you're right by God. Plugged into Christ, you
have the eyes and ears of God himself open to you - listening to
you, watching out for you. Plugged into Christ, you have the life
of Christ; you have heaven as your home. And plugged into
Christ, you have the family of God as your family.

What does that get to mean for us? It gives us something to think about. How am I plugging in to Christ? And not just me, how can we help others plug in to God with a heavy-duty

connection to the peace and power of Christ? At the same time, how can we help each other plug in and connect as a family in Christ, sharing the peace and power of Christ?

How? Our lesson gives us part of the answer - When it comes to plugging in with God, don't settle for a plug-in that just gets by. Plug in "heavy-duty" to draw as much power as God will give you. And don't settle for just a God-connection. Be a connector of God's family, let God use you to plug in with the family of God sharing his power and peace. And what will happen? We will all be blessed! Amen.


