Sermon followed by Service

August 22, 2021 Hebrews 10:19-25

Do you have a safe place? A Safe place to go when life gets ugly and dangerous? Where's your safe place? Let's say that the school year is off to a rough start; you can't hide in the bathroom or your dorm room all day - so where's your safe place? When you're waiting for word from your doctor, your lender, your boss - where's your safe place? With COVID - where's your safe place? With maskers and anti-maskers, vaxers and anti-vaxers all getting worked up, when they get in your face, when they get in your mind - where's your safe place? At home, at work, at school, when the biting and bullies are making you sick inside When day after day you hear voices of darkness (Why do you always ...? Why can't you ever ...?), when those voices are taking you to a dark, dark place - where's your safe place? When your conscience is accusing, your anxiety is stressing, your world is judging and demanding - where's your safe place? Where is your safe place?

Which of these situations / challenges are you or the people in your life facing?

We need a safe place, don't we? And the people around us, they need a safe place. Our lesson today shows us the safest of safe places. It's not a bunker in the basement. It's not a video screen or a pretend world you create for yourself up in your head. It's not in a bottle, a baggie, a needle, or a smoke. The safest of safe places is close in, together and tight with God.

Which of these pseudo-safe places are you or people in your life trying?

Some of you expected that answer. And some part of us all is disappointed in that answer. Why? Perhaps we see the hurt in our world, and we see how Christians, even Christians in close, tight and together with God, still hurt. And we can be quick to judge God even as God is working things out, like a newborn can be quick to judge mom even as mom is working things out - "Where's my food, my hug, my burp? Make my life right now!" We're not always good at looking out past right here, right now, are we? We kind of like "my way right here, right now." That's another reason we don't always like God as our safe place. We've got this two-year-old, tween, teen thing going on. We hold out one hand expecting God to give us what we want, but at the same time with our other hand we wave him off: "It's my life, let me do what I want." When people do that to you, how does that go over? There's another set of reasons we might not look to God as our safest safe place - God's judgment - "the soul that sins it shall die" - and our conscience. Most people know how they've waved God off. Most people know - someplace deep inside - that they have crossed God and that instead of being held safe by God, they deserve to be crossed out by God.

Why might people be disappointed with God as their safe place? Why might people avoid God as their safe place?

So most people search and settle for a safe place without God, even apart from God. And they miss out; they miss out on the hope we have. I should make clear what the Holy Spirit packs in that word "hope." When the Spirit talks of hope, he isn't talking about a future possibility, a maybe, or even a "more likely than not." No, when the Spirit talks of hope he is talking about our future reality. Let me say that again - when the Spirit talks of hope he is talking about our future reality with Jesus. When people search and settle for a safe place without God they miss out on that hope, the hope we have. As this world tears itself apart, they miss out on this hope, the hope of being held together for heaven. In this world of hurt, they miss out on this hope that we have - the healing of heaven where there will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain. In this world with so much evil, so much injustice, so much hurt, they miss out on the hope we have - a life made right - not just for the rich and strong - life made right for everyone with Jesus in heaven. In this world gone wrong, that's the hope we hold to. That's the future reality we hold to, in our safe place - in close, tight and together with God.

What hope keeps you going, brightens your day, makes you strong? How do people in your life see your hope and what your hope does for you?

But how can we be close in, tight and together with God? How can anyone have that hope after waving God off and crossing him the way we all have? Our lesson tells us how - Jesus! Our lesson is packed with Old Testament imagery fulfilled in Jesus. If we were to unpack it all here, we wouldn't get to our point for today. Let me unpack this much. How can we be close in, safe, tight and together with God? Jesus, with his flesh and blood sacrifice on the cross. By his blood, Jesus covered over and paid for our sin, the sin of the world. By his flesh, his perfect life and death, Jesus satisfied God's law and judgment. What does that get to mean for us? Picture for yourself God's forever safe place in heaven; picture for yourself God's safe place for you today, safe in his arms. With Jesus, that's your present and future reality! With Jesus, instead of seeing God, arms crossed, face scowling, his judgment damning and sending you away; with Jesus, you get to see God the Father, arms open, face smiling, inviting and welcoming you in to his hug and his heaven - in close, safe, tight and together with God today and forever.

But that's not all. Our lesson also points us to Jesus as priest over his church. And what is he doing? He's washing us. The Old Testament priests had their way to sprinkle and wash. In the New Testament, Jesus sprinkles our hearts and washes us clean in baptism. We don't need to think that our past guilt disqualifies us from being close to God; we don't need to think that our present struggles disqualify us from being close with God. Baptized into Christ, we get to confess: "God, have mercy on me a sinner." We get to beg: "Lord, make me new; help me to live new with you." And baptized into Christ, we get to know that he has done and he is doing just that. Baptized into Christ, you are washed and forgiven for life in close, tight and together with God.

What does your baptism mean for you?

What do we do with that? First, we live life close in, tight and together with God. "Let us draw near to God with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful." Our lesson fits so well for these times today. The congregation in our lesson was struggling with two very different things - the hard life of being a Christian in the face of persecution and the good life of the world. It was so tempting to give up their safe place with God, in close, tight and together with God, and to drift away living the life of the world. Sounds familiar, doesn't it? With so many forces out there against Christ and his church, it can seem easier to just live the life of the world. Add COVID, with the angst and anger about masks and vaccines, with the risk of getting sick, with just the inconvenience and discomfort of it all, it can be so tempting to leave our save place, in close, tight and together with God and just drift away.

How might we lead people to question whether church is a safe place? How can we help people to see church as a safe place?

So God calls us to gather together to stick together. Some argue: "I can stick close with God without gathering together with others." Perhaps. But Jesus and his Spirit aren't just interested in me thinking about me and what I want, or you thinking about you and what you want. Jesus and his Spirit are interested in me thinking about you, and you thinking about each other. That's right, Jesus and his Spirit want us concerned and caring about each other's relationship with God. Not to gossip. Not to judge. Not to lecture. Not to get in someone's face and criticize. But to encourage. To encourage love and good deeds. To encourage life close in, safe, tight and together with the Lord.

What helps you to think about your fellow Christians? What helps you to care about and encourage your fellow Christians?

Our lesson does just that: "Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching." Those aren't just a pastor's words; they're the words of our Lord and Savior. He knows how gathering together can encourage. Gathering together for worship, gathering together for Bible Study sends a message: "Worship is worth it; Bible Study is worth it; Jesus is worth our time and effort." Gathering together for worship, gathering together for Bible Study sends a message: "Life isn't just about my time, my schedule, my convenience; we aren't here just to live a 'my life.' We're here to live a life that connects our world with Jesus." Let me add, just one more - Gathering for worship, gathering for Bible Study sends a message: "I'm not alone in this; you're not alone in this. We're together, together with Jesus."

Satan will work to make our words of encouragement to come across as self-serving. What can we do so that our encouragement (to worship, for example) doesn't come across as self-serving?

How does worshiping together and Bible Study together encourage you?

Who needs that message? I know I do. And there's several hundred more people in your St. John family who need to hear the same message. Why? "**The Day is approaching**." We're living in dangerous times. Our whole family is living in dangerous times. And we have the safest safe place for these dangerous times - in close, tight and together with the Lord. Let's gather together and encourage each other and help each other to live in close, tight and together with the Lord. Amen.




CONFESSION & ABSOLUTION OF SINS

C: Amen.



CHILDREN'S TALK

HOLY BAPTISM II John Richard Smith Son of Joshua and Rebecca Smith

Our Lord Jesus Christ gave his Church the command to baptize when he said: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you."

Scripture makes plain the universal need for Baptism. As children of Adam, we belong to a fallen race. From our parents we inherit a sinful nature and would be lost forever unless delivered by our Lord Jesus Christ. He willingly took on himself the curse of sin and by his death on the cross redeemed us and all people.

Christ's almighty Word gives Baptism its power to save. The apostle Peter declares, "Baptism now saves you." Scripture also clearly teaches that the power and promise of Baptism is intended for young and old alike. On the day of Pentecost the apostle testified, "The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off - for all whom the Lord our God will call." By water and the Spirit, we are born again and united with Christ and his people as members of the Church.

M: In bringing *this child* to Baptism, you are doing what is God-pleasing. Jesus himself invited little children to become a part of his kingdom when he said: "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. I tell you the truth, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it." And he took the children in his arms, put his hands on them, and blessed them.

M:	Receive the sign of the cross on the head and heart to mark you as a redeemed child of Christ.
M:	, I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

M: The Almighty God - Father, Son, and Holy Spirit - has forgiven all your sins. By your baptism, you are born again and made a dear child of your Father in heaven.

May God strengthen you to live in your baptismal grace all the days of your life. Peace be with you.

R: Yes, and we/I ask God to help us/me.


EXHORTATION TO CONGREGATION





Children's Talks / Children's Sermons

Is it a Children's Talk or a Children's Sermon? Whatever we call it, I'm always praying that it doesn't turn into a Pastor's Disaster! So why do we have them? To show our children: "Church is for you too!"

Here's what we do. At some point in the service (whenever it suits me and what I want to say), I announce and invite: "It's time for our children's talk." Then our young ones walk up to the front of the church and sit on the floor between the first pew and the first chancel step. It's always helpful to have some of our middle-grade students join them, to sit between the youngest and show them how it's done. Sometimes a parent will bring their young one up front and then sit in the front pew (or even closer on the floor). After our "talk," our children return to their seats and we continue with the service.

"Church is for you too!" There are other ways we show our children that church (and Jesus) is for them too. We don't have to sit in the back and seat our children behind a tall wall of adults; our children do learn to worship well sitting up closer to the front where they can feel more a part of the worship service instead of just part of the "kid's section." We also have Children's Bags stocked with worship helps and we have Children's Bulletins. The Children's Bulletins come in 2 colors, with a preschool version and an older version. I'm told (by parents who quizzed their children about the sermon and service every week) that the Children's bulletins and bags aren't so much a distraction for the mind as a distraction for the hands to help keep the mind in church.

If you have questions about how all that works, ask some of our other parents with children. We all know that most every young child has a rough Sunday now and then. When your child needs a break, we have room to stretch in the back Gathering Area, and in our Fellowship Hall (where the service should be on the screen). When moms and dads wait until the children are older, the children just seem to have their rough Sundays when they are older. So start early with Jesus' invitation: "Bring the little children to me," and we'll all be blessed!
